The Tournament Policy Board

The Tournament Policy Board establishes goals and policies for the operation of the TPA TOUR. The 10-member Board is composed of the following:

Four Player Directors, elected by the TPA TOUR membership. A Player Director also serves as Vice President of the PGA of America.

Three Independent Directors, representing the public interest. One serves as Chairman of the Board.

Three PGA Directors, who are national officers of the PGA of America.

A Players Advisory Council consults with the Policy Board.

The Policy Board appoints the Commissioner as chief executive and administrative officer of the TPA TOUR. The Tournament Staff, serving under the Commissioner and the Tournament Director conducts tournament play.

A Message from Deane R. Beman

TPA TOUR Commissioner

The 1981 season was extraordinary, one which demonstrated forcefully the extremely high level of competition which now exists in Tournament Players Association competition. Not since 1964, when Jack Nicklaus edged Arnold Palmer for the money title by less than \$85, has there been such a race for the money title.

But 1981 was different in that FOUR players, not two, went into the final tournament with realistic hopes of claiming that crown. The fact

that the money title in 1981, for the first time, included ownership of the first Arnold Palmer Award, made the race especially intense and obviously significant to the four players involved.

In the end, it was Tom Kite and his remarkable record of consistent excellence which prevailed ... \$375,699 in official earnings ... 26 straight cashing efforts ... an incredible 21 finishes in the top ten ... a streak of 35 events in which he has made the cut ... simply a remarkable year.

Raymond Floyd finished second, with \$359,360, and his year included victories in the Doral-Eastern Open, the Tournament Players Championship and the Manufacturers Hanover Westchester Classic. His back-to-back titles at Doral and in the TPC also provided a \$200,000 bonus from the ''Florida Triple Bonus''.

And an indication of the kind of year 1981 really was is provided by Tom Watson, who earned \$347,660, won the Masters, the USF&G New Orleans Open, and the Atlanta Golf Classic — yet was considered, in comparison to the last four seasons, to have had a "poor" year. It was, perhaps, a lesser year by his own lofty standards, but it was still a fantastic season.

And then there was Bruce Lietzke, who finished fourth on the money list with \$343,446. He won three titles, was second twice and third once — but couldn't overcome the heroics of the others.

And finally there was Bill Rogers, whose considerable skills surfaced at opportune times all season. He won the Sea Pines Heritage Classic in March at Harbour Town; he celebrated July by winning the British Open at Royal St. George's; in August it was the World Series of Golf, which he claimed with a fittingly dramatic birdie putt at the final hole; and in September he won the Texas Open in his home state. Thus, the man who finished fifth on the Official Money List, with \$315,411, may well have had the best season of all.

Throughout the year, TPA TOUR tournament sponsors enjoyed solid success at the gate, with record crowds and a second consecutive year of \$5-million-plus in proceeds returned to their respective civic and charitable programs. Total proceeds from TPA TOUR events, since such record-keeping was begun, is now approaching the \$45 million mark.

The combination of the most gifted group of players the game has ever seen, the broad support of the communities in which they play, an unswerving dedication to the traditions and integrity of the game and, most importantly, the outstanding support of the volunteers who make them possible, are the things that make TPA TOUR tournaments such outstanding sports attractions.

The Tournament Players Association is proud to contribute to the game's growth and the enjoyment of it in cities throughout the country. And we are most proud of the fact that the TPA TOUR's real money leader each year is charity.

A Brief History of the TPA TOUR

The precise start of the TPA TOUR defies documentation. We know, for example, that professionals competed against each other from the earliest days of the game in this country. We know, too, that the first United States Open, held in 1895 at Newport, R.I., attracted a field of 10 professionals and one amateur. A second professional tournament, the Western Open, was first held in 1899. It has now observed its 76th anniversary and continues to thrive on the TPA TOUR with a youthful spirit.

However, it would be stretching history beyond reason to say the TPA TOUR started with the Western Open in 1899 because there was not a "tour" at that time. Tournaments continued to spring up across the country during the first decade of this century but they lacked continuity. American-born professionals were rapidly improving and, in 1911, John McDermott became the first home-bred to win the U.S. Open.

In 1913 a commercially-backed "tour" by Englishmen Harry Vardon and Ted Ray helped to popularize the game in this country as the pair attracted "record" crowds everywhere they played. That September a 20-year-old "local boy," Francis Ouimet, defeated both of the visitors in a playoff for the United States Open Championship at Brookline, Mass., and his victory became a golf benchmark. Suddenly, golf became Page One news and a game for everyone.

The forerunner of today's TPA TOUR is traced to the early Twenties when, in the winter, tournaments were held on the West Coast, Texas, and Florida. Golfers played their way into the East and up to Pinehurst in the spring. Those years have been recalled by Johnny Farrell, one of the most active players of that decade and the next, as well as the 1928 U.S. Open champion: "Those tournaments gave the boys some activity in the off-season because most were busy at their clubs in the summer. The summer was when the golf associations would hold regional and national title events."

Resorts, hotels, and Chambers of Commerce realized the publicity value that professional golf brought to their facilities and more tournaments sprang up. Walter Hagen, Gene Sarazen, and Bobby Jones became folk heroes and the Tour was taking shape.

By the Thirties the Tour was growing, and with the PGA of America providing leadership, it attracted throngs despite the financially depressed years at the beginning of the decade. One statistic from those days stands out now with economic poignancy: Paul Runyan was the leading money winner of 1934 with \$6,767. Late in the decade the name of Sam Snead started to appear in headlines with regularity. Then, as the Forties started, Ben Hogan, Byron Nelson, and a host of others gained fame.

After World War II, the Tour became more structured than ever before and continued to grow in popularity until it exploded as the Fifties were turning into the Sixties. (Elsewhere in this Tour Book, our records such as leading money winner, growth of our purses, etc., reflect this growth.)

About this time television began playing a dual role. Telecasts of TPA TOUR events inspired millions to try the game, and, at the same time, the TV rights fees sent purses rolling upward. The bulk of rights fees, which are distributed by the TPA TOUR to all co-sponsors, have gone back into purses, accounting for the doubling of prize money in the last decade.

It was late in 1968 when the touring professionals picked up the reins of control of the Tour. Joseph C. Dey was the first Commissioner of what was then called the Tournament Players Division. He served from early 1969 through February 28, 1974, and was succeeded by Deane R. Beman, who took office on March 1, 1974.

During the Beman administration the value of tournament purses has escalated and reached \$14.5 million by 1981. The TPA TOUR operation has become more business-like and professional. Two agronomists have been added to the staff to provide turf management advice and assistance to all events. The Tournament Players Championship, the players' own, has become one of the most significant events on the Tour and the new World Series of Golf has provided a climax to the season.

The greatest advancement of all was unveiled in October 1980 with the official dedication and opening of the multi-million dollar Tournament Players Club and the new National Headquarters building for the TPA TOUR, in Ponte Vedra Beach, Fla. There is more on the Tournament Players Club and Course elsewhere in the Tour Book.

TPA TOUR Media Regulations

General Regulations

The following regulations are to be followed by all members of the Media:

- Remain close up against gallery ropes in such a way as to appear to be a part of the gallery at all times. An ARM BAND is necessary.
- Players are not to be distracted during play. DO NOT interview players or ask them to pose for photographs during their round.
- DO NOT interview players or ask them to pose for photographs during their practice sessions prior to their round except by prior arrangement with the player.
- Do not disturb players at their 18th green and/or scoring tent until after they have checked, signed and returned their scorecards.

Working Press Regulations

To avoid embarrassment to you and distraction to the contestants:

- 1. Do not walk or stand in playing areas.
- 2. Follow directions of marshals and other officials.
- Do not interview during play. The leading players each day and other requested will be interviewed following their rounds in the Press Room interview area.

Tape Recorder Regulations

- All tape recorder work should be done in the proximity of the Press Room and/or Clubhouse.
- 2. Tape recorders are NOT permitted in the locker room.
- 3. Tape recorders are NOT permitted within the playing area of the golf course.
- 4. If an interview is to be taped in the practice areas, either the range or the putting green, it must be done by prior arrangement with the player and up against the ropes and NOT in the middle of the areas where it could be distracting to other players.

TPA TOUR Photography Regulations

This Tournament is essentially for the players. Fair play requires that there be no noise or other distractions. The interests of all others must be subordinated to the players interests. The result of any one shot could decide the Tournament.

Only accredited photographers for RECOGNIZED NEWS MEDIA will be permitted to take pictures during the Tournament. Photography will be restricted to news use. Commercial and personal photography is prohibited (except that spectators may take pictures on practice days and during a Pro-Am).

The following regulations apply to accredited news and television photographers and motion picture cameramen as a condition of the privilege of taking pictures:

General - All Photographers

A photographer must not ask a player to pose during a round.

If a player or an official requests that no photographs be taken in a certain situation, the request must be honored immediately, without discussion.

A camera must not be pointed at a player about to make a stroke in any manner which might tend to disturb him or distract his attention.

At the 9th and the 18th greens, photographers must not approach, delay or distract a player until he has checked, signed and returned his scorecard to the proper official. Under the Rules of Golf, a player turning in an incorrect scorecard in stroke play may be disgualified.

Cameras are not permitted in the locker room.

Photography Regulations (cont'd)

Still Photographers

Only still photographers to whom arm bands have been issued will be permitted inside gallery lines. They must station themselves immediately inside such lines, and not more than an ARM'S LENGTH FROM THE LINES, so as to blend into the gallery and appear to be part of the gallery. They must not take conspicuous positions in the open.

Any photographer who violates this regulation will forfeit the right to enter gallery lines and possibly to work at the tournament.

Close-up action shots are prohibited.

All pictures must be taken at appreciable distances, as far from the players as possible and from angles which are not acute to the line of play.

Pictures, even from a distance, may not be made until the player has completed his stroke. The photographer must not release his camera shutter until the shot is made.

Motion Picture/Videotape Photographers

Motion or videotape pictures may be taken only from *outside gallery lines* or from areas designated by the TPA TOUR. Motion pictures or videotape may be taken from such locations during a stroke.

Only modern equipment which makes a minimum of noise can be used. Motion picture cameras must be equipped with noise-deadening blimps or hoods.

Use of golf carts by news or television photographers is not permitted during play.

A maximum of two working camera crew members will be permitted per camera.

Difficulties will be avoided if photographers are fair and will treat players as they themselves would wish to be treated in similar circumstances.

The cooperation of all photographers will be appreciated.

THE TOURNAMENT PLAYERS CLUB

If there were an opportunity to create, without major restrictions, the ideal championship golf course, the parameters laid out by Commissioner Deane Beman and designer Pete Dye for the Tournament Players Club at Sawgrass in Ponte Vedra, FL, would provide a fitting model. As home of the Tournaments Players Championship, site of the TPA TOUR's National Headquarters and the "home course" for its members, the Players Club was to be special from the beginning.

The competitive testing of the practical application of those parameters begins this year, as the course becomes the fifth and permanent home of the TPC, a tournament which has been contested over four notable courses in the past. The TPC's tradition of superb fields on excellent courses will certainly continue at the Players Club.

Among the parameters laid down for the Tournament Players Club were provisions for a variety of par five holes. One was to be short and very reachable by virtually every TPC player. Two others, of medium length, would afford skilled and strong players a reasonable option of going for the green in two — but not without the threat of penalty. And the fourth would be a supreme challenge, forcing all players to play it as a three-shot hole.

For the four three-pars, the thinking was to have one short one with a high degree of risk — which the 132-yard 17th hole certainly offers with its island green. Two others, of medium length, require a high degree of skill with medium irons. And the fourth is of substantial length, offering a fittingly larger target green.

The 10 par four holes, likewise, provide a blend of short, medium and long challenges, each with a unique blend of subtleties reflected in waste areas, bunkering, trees, water and length of approach shot. Demands for accuracy from the tee are balanced, as the longer holes provide more spacious fairways, the shorter demanding precision placement.

The overall concept of the course included unprecedented attention to the provisions for galleries, and acres of large spectator mounds afford spectators broad vistas. And the course route plan loops back to proximity of the clubhouse area every three or four holes.

And finally, each hole is a visual pleasure as well as a competitive challenge, together presenting the player with a tremendous variety of strategic decisions to be made and shots to be executed. As a whole, the course was intended to provide such a thorough examination of skill that any deficiency in one area of the game could not be completely overcome by unusual skill in another.

Tournament Players Club (cont'd.)

With the TPC in mind, both nines of the course were further designed to provide similar challenges over the first two holes. Both sides, in fact, begin with par fours of modest length, followed by reachable five-pars. The course is thus balanced for players who, over the first two rounds, will be beginning play from both the first and the tenth tees.

The course is a par 72 of 6,857 yards, and was dedicated on October 25, 1980. Ground was broken on the project on February 12, 1979, and more than a million yards of earth were moved in its creation. Much of the unique foliage of the area was retained, including impressive specimens of live oak, palm, pine, sweet gum and magnolia trees.

The course site is 415 acres, including the TPA TOUR Headquarters site, an 18-acre practice area and provisions for up to 100 acres of tournament parking.

The clubhouse is a 37,500 square foot structure which sits atop a man-made berm. The three-level structure provides comfortable dining and lounge areas, locker room and pro shop facilities, conference and meeting rooms plus cart and general storage.

The club began the year with more than 5,000 members from across the nation, with that number expected to approach the 10,000 mark by year's end. It is intended to serve well the purposes of a championship site for the best players in the world and to provide for the avid golfer and fan a memorable golf experience.

VANTAGE SCOREBOARD: Keeping Spectators Informed

The Vantage Scoreboards, sponsored by the RJReynolds Tobacco Company, will be bringing their electronic marvels to a majority of TPA TOUR tournaments during the 1982 season.

The twin systems of computer-controlled scoreboards visited 19 tournaments during the introductory 1981 season, and that number will grow to more than 30 during 1982.

Chief beneficiaries of the program, of course, are the thousands of spectators who throng each week to TPA TOUR competitions. Never before has it been possible for spectators at each hole around the course to know — within seconds — what has transpired on every other hole on the course.

Transported in identical 45-foot semi-tractor trailer units, the two Vantage Scoreboard systems leap-frog along the TPA TOUR tournament trail, providing one large leader-information board and up to 20 smaller leader-status information boards at appropriate locations where crowds gather on the course.

Not only are scores and up-to-the-minute status reports on the leaders provided regularly, but biographical and statistical information on each player is also provided as he approaches the green. Special messages, scoring records, unusual events like a double eagle — all can be flashed up on the scoreboards quickly to keep spectators completely informed.

A project of the TPA TOUR'S Marketing Department, the Vantage Scoreboards were developed by the American Sign & Indicator Co. under TPA TOUR guidance. The systems were thoroughly shaken down during 1981 and modifications made will offer increased versatility and utilization during 1982.

As part of its major commitment to golf, the sponsoring RJReynolds Tobacco Company, through its Vantage brand, is complementing the Vantage Scoreboard program with farreaching promotional efforts. The "World of Golf", for instance, is a mobile exhibit which depicts the origins of the game of golf, its leading players, the manufacture of modern playing equipment and today's greatest tournaments. The ultra-modern exhibit will precede the TPA TOUR and thus the Vantage Scoreboards into cities where tournaments are played.

The Vantage Scoreboard program is a major part of the TPA TOUR's commitment to 'broaden the base' of golf, helping to bring a new generation of fans and players in closer touch with the game's greatest stars.



The Exempt TOUR: A New Look for 1983

The 1982 season is one of transition for the TPA TOUR as preparations go forward for the implementation of the Exempt TOUR for 1983. Under the plan ratified by the Tournament Policy Board on October 31, 1981, Monday Qualifying will be eliminated and tournament fields will be established two weeks in advance.

For 1982, the TPA TOUR will function as in the past, with Monday Qualifying continuing to be held at the tournament sites. In anticipation of the Exempt TOUR, however, the annual Spring Qualifying Competition has been eliminated for 1982 while Fall Qualifying will be expanded.

Players are competing this year for Exempt Top 125, not Top 60, spots, as 125 has been set as the exemption level on the official money list at year's end. Other players holding unlimited and long-term exemptions will likewise be a part of the exempt list for 1983, as in the past.

The TPA TOUR membership for 1983 will further include successful qualifiers from what becomes, in October and November of 1982, a once-yearly Qualifying Tournament, from which the low 50 scorers and those tied for 50th will earn player "cards" as well as exempt status.

Players finishing from 126th to 150th on the final 1982 official money list will retain their membership and will also be exempted into the Finals of the year-end Qualifying Tournament.

The Qualifying Tournament will begin in October with a number of Local Qualifiers. Leaders from the Local events will advance to Regional Tournament where, again, leaders will advance to the Final Tournament which will be held in early November at the Tournament Players Club at Sawgrass, in Ponte Vedra, FL.

Some 200 to 220 players are thus expected to hold exempt status going into the 1983 season, or more than double the current number. With a standard starting field of 156 players, reduced to 144 during the shorter days of winter, it is obvious that not all players will be able to play in every event.

Under Exempt TOUR provisions, however, players will be required to commit to play in a given event two weeks in advance. Players lower on the ranking list will thus know in advance whether or not they will be in the starting field.

Access to TPA TOUR membership will be via the major year-end Qualifying Tournament. In addition, "Open" Qualifying will be continued in 1983, from which four other players, either amateur or professional, will gain entry to each open event.

Additional access to TPA TOUR events will continue in the form of Sectional Qualifying, from which four members of the local PGA Section in which the tournament is played will gain entry. Other players will be exempted into the event via Sponsor Exemptions, as in the past.

In summation, TPA TOUR players are competing this year to establish their ranking under provisions of the Exempt TOUR for 1983. The prime target is the top 125 places on the yearend money list.

The result will be, in 1983, a TPA TOUR which frees its members of the unnecessary expense and inconvenience of traveling to a tournament site where a single competitive round (Monday Qualifying) determined whether or not they would be able to compete.

Elimination of Monday Qualifying further frees tournament sponsors and the TPA TOUR staff of an administrative burden, allowing them to focus energies on the conduct of the tournament itself.

It would be interesting to know what sort of record George Archer would have compiled had he been 100 percent healthy for the past decade.

Only twice in the last 10 years has he gone into a season feeling as fit as he should be, and both years, he won well over \$100,000. Last year was one of those, as he chalked up six top 10 finishes in 30 starts. Only six times did he fail to go the distance.

His best effort was in the Memorial Tournament where he tied for third place. After a pair of 69's in the middle rounds, George was deadlocked with Tom Kite and Craig Stadler for the lead at fourunder par, but a closing 75 dashed his hopes.

Over his lengthy career, which started in 1964, George has been known for his putting stroke, so it seems appropriate that he owns the all-time Tour record for fewest putts in a tournament. In the 1980 Sea Pines Heritage Classic, he only needed 94.

Twice in the last seven years, George has had major surgery. In 1975, he underwent the knife to repair a torn tendon in his left wrist and his effectiveness in 1974, 1975 and part of 1976 was seriously affected.

He had an excellent 1977, winning \$113,944, but he then encountered a back problem that required surgery in early 1979. He had two discs fused and it wasn't until July of that year that he was able to return to the front line. Because of the problem, though, he only won a total of \$16,941 in 1978 and 1979.

He came back in 1980 and managed to slip into the 60th position on the money list, and thus assure himself of exempt status.

The lanky Archer never let his problems get him down. "I don't let anything bother me," he said. "I'm just happy to be out here and playing decently again."

Archer began playing golf at age 12 around his native San Francisco and he gathered an exceptional amateur record before he turned pro 13 years later. In 1963 alone he won the Trans-Mississippi Amateur, the Northern California Open and the San Francisco City title, reached the semifinals of the U.S. Amateur and was low amateur for the third straight year in the Lucky International in his home town.

As a pro he has won 12 events, including three in 1968, but the year following was his most memorable when he captured the Bing Crosby National Pro-Am and his one major championship when he beat out Billy Casper, George Knudson and Tom Weiskopf to take the Masters.

Life on the TPA TOUR has not been easy for Dave Barr, but the big Canadian found a ray of sunshine in July of last year. He emerged from a five-way playoff to win the Quad Cities Open.

Dave was highly-successful playing his native Canadian Tour before finally earning his United States Tour card in the Fall of 1977 Qualifying School.

In 1977, he won the Canadian Order of Merit, and five times won events north of the border. Twice, in 1977 and 1978, he was selected to represent his homeland in the World Cup competition. There were many who regarded him as the finest Canadian player since George Knudson.

During his first three years on the Tour, though, Dave had his problems. "I used to believe I was a pretty good player," he says, "but during the tough years, you begin to wonder about that. I've had to take a back seat to Dan Halldorson and Jin Nelford among the Canadian players.

"It did make a difference when Dan won at Pensacola (in the fall of 1980). He suddenly was the one Canadian everyone recognized, but what it also did was make everyone realize there were Canadians who could play and win on the Tour," he added.

When the final round started at Quad Cities, Dave was five strokes behind Victor Regalado. A closing 66 shot him into a tie at the end of regulation play with Halldorson, Woody Blackburn, Frank Conner and Regalado.

It was eight holes later (only one playoff in Tour history has been longer), that Dave managed a par and that was all he needed to gain his elusive triumph.

It was worth \$36,000 and that nearly equaled his entire career earnings to that point, and nearly doubled the amount he won in 1980.

"This is great," he said. "It's what we all play for out here. When things are not going well, you sometimes wonder if you made the right decision. Winning makes it all worth it."

The victory gave him an exemption from qualifying through the 1982 Quad Cities Open.

During the Glen Campbell-Los Angeles Open in February of 1981, Andy Bean hit a shot off of a hard surface, and felt a shock in his left wrist. He kept on playing, although it was not a good tournament for him.

The next week in the Bay Hill Classic, he was his usual awesome self. He was positively brilliant as he fashioned an 18-under par score of 266, aided mightily by a 62 in the second round. He won by seven strokes over Tom Watson.

Such performances tend to ease any pain, and Andy continued to play well for the next few weeks. Finally, though, after the USF&G New Orleans Open at the end of April, he could stand it no longer.

He went home, and the hand was placed in a cast. When the doctor removed it in July, the hand still hurt. Closer examination revealed a slight fracture near the base of the thumb. "When I kept playing after Los Angeles," Andy said, "all that did was aggravate the injury."

He finally returned for the last two official events, the Southern and Pensacola Opens. He still won over \$100,000 for the fifth straight year.

In his first Tour victory at Doral, Andy led all four days on the Blue Monster course, shooting 67-67-71-72—277. The win became a birthday present; he turned 24 on the final day, March 13.

During his rookie year of 1976, Bean's play was disappointing, especially to himself. "It was mainly temperament," he says. "I knew I had the game to play out here, but when I'd make a mistake I'd get hot at myself, and that would make everything worse. I wasn't able to manage my game."

Andy certainly had the background to become a professional golfer. As a youngster, he lived on Jekyll Island, Ga., where his father was associated with a golf course. When he was 15, the family moved to Lakeland, Fla., where his father bought a course.

"I've been lucky," says Bean, "because my parents never made me do much work around the course. They let me go play." And play he did.

When George Burns headed for the 1981 United States Open at the Merion Golf Club in June, he didn't expect any miracles, even though he did finish fifth in the Manufacturers Hanover-Westchester Classic the previous week.

During the first three rounds at Merion, though, he was brilliant. His rounds of 69, 66 and 68 gave him a total of seven-under par 203 and that was three better than David Graham.

Although the record book shows he posted a closing 73, it also will show that Graham played one of the finest rounds of his career, a 67, to win the Open crown by one over George and Bill Rogers.

"I felt I played well," George said later, "but David just went out and took the championship. I wasn't expecting to do well when I came here so I'm leaving with far more than I came with last Monday."

Although George topped the \$100,000 mark again, he was bothered with nagging injuries. He jammed his right wrist on the tee at the Western Open, and that cost him a month in mid-summer.

Although 1981 was a good year, it was not as productive as 1980 when he won the Bing Crosby National Pro-Am, and earned \$219,928.

Burns was too busy playing all sports in high school on Long Island to concentrate on golf. He lettered in football and basketball and entered the University of Maryland with the primary purpose of playing football, in addition to earning a degree.

He was a defensive end for the Terps, but recalls, "I realized I wasn't going to go anywhere in football." He concentrated on golf from his freshman year forward.

However, it was a full year after his graduation before he blossomed as a force in amateur golf. While working for two years in the New York City area in sales and promotion, he had a chance to play often, and in 1973 he won the Canadian Amateur. The following year Burns won the Porter Cup, North-South Amateur and the New York State Amateur.

Burns was selected to play on the Walker Cup team in 1975 and also on the U.S. side in the World Amateur team championship. "Playing for my country on those teams always will be among the biggest enjoyments I've had in sports," he says today.

There they were again, Billy Casper and Arnold Palmer, standing on the first tee ready for their playoff for the United States Open Championship, just as they were at the 1966 Open Championship at the Olympic Club in San Francisco.

Only this time, they were playing for the Seniors Open title, and Bob Stone was the third man in the playoff at Oakland Hills in Detroit.

While Billy was able to defeat Arnold in 1966, this time he couldn't do it, but he did enjoy reliving a bit of golf history, just a month after being eligible for the Seniors.

Billy's play on the TPA TOUR has been cut back sharply the last couple of years, and he now plans to focus his talents on the 50-years and over competition.

There have been so many highlights to this Hall-of-Famers career that some of the better ones tend to get overlooked. Lee Trevino won the Vardon Trophy in 1980 with a brilliant 69.73 average. You have to go back to 1968, when Casper had a 69.82 mark, to find the last man to shatter the 70-stroke barrier. Billy won the prestigious Vardon Trophy five times.

He also qualified to play on eight straight Ryder Cup teams, from 1961 through 1975. As a reward for his past performances, he was named to captain the 1979 Ryder Cup team that went on to defeat Great Britain-Ireland-Europe.

When Billy passed the \$1 million mark in winnings in 1970, only Arnold Palmer had done it before. Here is a man with 51 TPA TOUR crowns, including the 1959 and 1966 United States Opens and the 1970 Masters. There have been few in the game any better.

Bobby Clampett said he "was happy" with the progress he made during his first full year on the TPA TOUR. And, well he should be.

The young man from Carmel Valley Ranch, Calif., finished second four times in 1981, and twice came within a putt of winning golf tournaments. He lost playoffs to John Cook in the Bing Crosby National Pro-Am and to Hale Irwin in the Buick Open.

He tied for second on two other occasions, in the Manufacturers Hanover-Westchester Classic and the Sammy Davis, Jr.-Greater Hartford Open. In the latter, he carved out a beautiful 64 the last day.

He finished the year with a healthy 184,710, and his scoring average of 70.77 was eighth best on Tour.

He joined the Tour in August of 1980 after winning \$7,250 in the Buick Open. That gave him more than the minimum guideline of \$8,000 needed to become a member without going through the rigors of the Qualifying School.

Bobby started to play golf at age 10, using his father's old clubs. Lee Martin, who was the pro at the Carmel Valley Ranch at the time, gave him his first lessons. "I worked at the club, doing odd jobs," he recalls, "and my pay was playing privileges. Mainly, I picked up range balls."

When he was 13, Ben Doyle assumed duties at the club, and he became Bobby's tutor — and he still is.

He started playing tournament golf at age 11, and the next summer, he made a big decision. "I gave up a chance to be a starting pitcher on a Little League team to concentrate on golf," he recalls.

He was successful in California Junior golf, and in 1976 and 1977, he was the state's leading point getter. In 1977, he won the California State junior title.

He moved on to Brigham Young University, where, for three years, he worked on his golfing skills and his education. "I wanted that balance," he said, "and that is why I chose BYU."

He received an associates degree in French in 1980, and speaks the language fluently.

Since he played in six tournaments in 1980, he was not eligible for rookie-of-the-year honors in 1981. However, Bobby Clampett is destined to win many other honors in golf before he leaves the tournament trail.

While some players tend to slow down when they get around the 40 mark, Jim Colbert is just starting to heat up. He had his best year ever — moneywise — in 1980 with \$150,411, and followed it up last year with more than \$100,000.

His best chance for victory came in the Western Open when he tied for second as Ed Fiori played a marvelous final round to win it. Jim was in contention until he suffered a triple-bogey eight at the seventh hole at Butler National, but in true Colbert fashion, he came back to eagle the 12th and then birdle the last two holes to earn his biggest paycheck of the year.

He was tied with Craig Stadler through three rounds of the Texas Open in San Antonio, but Bill Rogers and Ben Crenshaw played the hot final rounds to force a playoff, while Jim and Craig tied with Bob Murphy for third.

Jim was an all-state football player in Kansas and went to Kansas State University on a scholarship, but he switched to golf full-time when he lost his desire for combat after his freshman year.

He won the Kansas State junior golf title at age 11, so he knew at an early age he could play this game, too. He was second in the 1964 NCAA tournament and won the 1965 Kansas Amateur. That fall, he went to the Tour's Qualifying School and made it.

The first victory was a long time coming, in the 1969 Monsanto Open in Pensacola. His most memorable victory probably was in the 1974 American Golf Classic at Firestone Country Club in Akron. He had to defeat Raymond Floyd, Gay Brewer and Forrest Fezler in the playoff.

The next few years, Jim suffered with knee and back problems, but he continued to work hard at his game, grinding out whatever he could. His perseverance finally paid off in 1979 and he has been playing well since.

The fine 1980 season was highlighted by a victory in the Joe Garagiola-Tucson Open. Because of rain-and-flood conditions, he didn't nail it down until Tuesday afternoon, winning by four over Dan Halldorson at Tucson National Golf Club.

Last fall, Jim was re-elected a Player Director on the Tour's Tournament Policy Board. He also served in the mid-1970's.

Frank Conner is a rare commodity. He has played for U. S. Open championships in golf and tennis. Sports buffs say Ellsworth Vines is the only other man who can claim the honor.

While Frank started to play tennis as a 10-year old in Belleville, Ill., he didn't begin to swing the clubs until 1970, when he was 24 years old.

"When I decided to switch to golf," he says, "I did so with the intention of being a professional. I felt I wasn't going anywhere in tennis, beyond what I had already done."

As a sophomore and junior at Trinity University, he was an All-American choice in tennis. He won the National Junior tennis title at age 17 and played in three Opens at Forrest Hills.

During the transition period, he would teach tennis at Northern Hills Country Club in San Antonio five days a week, and play the mini-tour series that was in San Antonio the other two. When that series was completed, he moved on to the mini-tours in the Phoenix area, and was quite successful.

"I knew then that I could earn money playing golf, but not that much playing tennis," he admits.

Four times he attempted to earn his Tour card, but missed in the Qualifying Schools. Finally, in the Fall of 1974, he made it. "I've improved each year," he said, "and that is encouraging. I've never had a sponsor, so I can get along with less.

In recent years, he has played numerous practice rounds with Lee Trevino, and says, "That has helped me tremendously, just watching how he plays the game and thinks his way around a course."

Frank has had his good moments on the Tour, such as finishing in a tie for second in the 1979 New Orleans Open, one behind Hubert Green. He led the 1980 IVB-Philadelphia Classic after three rounds, but Doug Tewell came on strong to win.

This past year, he tied with four others in the Quad Cities Open but Canadian Dave Barr won the playoff. He played the strong courses well, as he tied for sixth in the U.S. Open at Merion, was sixth alone in the Colonial National Invitation and tied for eighth in the Tournament Players Championship at Sawgrass.

John Cook has been appropriately labeled one of the brightest young stars on the TPA TOUR. The sky appears to be his only limit, as he has all the tools needed for success.

He turned in a solid performance in the Bing Crosby National Pro-Am in 1981, battling his way into a playoff with Hale Irwin, Ben Crenshaw, Bobby Clampett and Barney Thompson. The latter three were eliminated on the first extra hole at Pebble Beach, and John finally ousted Irwin with a par at the third.

Due to heavy rains, the event was shortened to 54 holes.

He played well on the West Coast, but he hit a snag when the Tour swung east, and he missed cuts in his first four starts, but a fine effort at the Masters stopped that streak.

He has always known of the thrill of victory. He tasted it early when in 1974 he defeated Gary Hallberg for the World Junior crown. They have been good friends ever since.

John's biggest title came in 1978 when he won the U.S. Amateur Championship. The next year, he lost in the final to Mark O'Meara.

At Ohio State University, he was an All-American choice three years, and in 1979, he helped the Buckeyes win the NCAA team title. That same year, he represented the United States in the World Amateur Cup team.

John started to play golf at an early age, and while his parents encouraged him, they didn't push. He played high school basketball and some football, but his dad, Jim Cook, pointed out, "he really was too light for football, and I was concerned that he might get hurt."

That's when golf became his game. Jack Nicklaus and Tom Weiskopf convinced him he should go to Ohio State, even though most of his school years were spent in southern California. Years ago, his father had coached in Ohio, and also worked for Firestone Tire & Rubber Company in Akron. His sister, Cathy, incidentally, also is at Ohio State, and 1979 as a sophomore, helped the women's team win the Big Ten golf title.

John earned his player's card in the Qualifying School in the Fall of 1979. For most of his golfing career, Ken Venturi has been his prime tutor.

Choosing between two sports when careers in each are imminent is one thing. It is another thing entirely to choose between two sports when a freshman in high school — and prove eight years later that the decision was absolutely correct. But that was the case with Fred Couples, who was forced to decide whether he would play baseball or golf as a freshman prep star in Seattle. From the looks of his rookie 1981 season on the TPA TOUR, Couples would have been hard-pressed to make any decision more correctly.

Although he did not make a cut until the Tour reached Florida in late February, he wasted no time proving he belonged. His first three paychecks totalled nearly \$5,000... and a month later he tied for fifth at New Orleans to bring his earnings to nearly \$20,000. It was at this point that Couples began to revise the goals he had set, and the thought of making the Top 60 exempt list loomed as a real possibility.

"I didn't start with the Top 60 in mind last year, but after New Orleans I guess I realized that I really could compete out here. It was especially satisfying to play as well as I did at Pensacola (tying for third) with the pressure on to make the Top 60," he noted.

Couples wound up being involved in another race during the season — chasing Dan Pohl for leadership in the Driving Distance category of the TPA TOUR's Official Statistics. It became, however, something of a lesson in the requirements of competent Tour play. Pohl pulled away from Couples to win the distance title — and Couples, seeking to improve his accuracy without regard to distance, safely tucked away his exempt Top 60 position and pulled to within \$16,000 of Pohl in 1981 earnings. Ironically, Pohl also has baseball in his background and attributes much of his length to the wrist strength and timing developed on the sandlots.

Couples was introduced to golf by his father, who works for the Seattle Parks & Recreation Department. So all sports were a natural with him. His older brother became a baseball player at the semi-pro level, but even he played on weekends, and eventually the younger Fred joined them.

Within a few years, he was competing in junior events in the Seattle area, and then, in high school, came the big decision, one forced because the golf and baseball seasons overlapped.

At the University of Houston, Couples became a standout, earning All-American honors in 1978 and 1979. After a somewhat disappointing junior season, when Fred finished a solid eighth individually in the NCAA Championship but watched as his Cougar team missed the cut, he decided to drop out of school and tackle the Tour a year early.

At the same time Fred quit school, his wife-to-be, Deborah Morgan, did likewise, becoming a tennis professional in Palm Springs, CA, to help Fred establish himself on the TPA TOUR.

He sailed through the Fall, 1980 Qualifying School and, as 1981 proved conclusively, he again made the right decision.

On the surface, it appeared as if Ben Crenshaw enjoyed another fine year in 1981; but that was not the case at all.

"It wasn't a fun year," he said, "because I didn't accomplish the things I wanted to accomplish," meaning winning a major. Unfortunately, Ben did not win at all, although he did lose twice in playoffs.

"It was a strange year," he said. "I found myself being indecisive too many times. I'd hit a good drive and then find myself between clubs on the next shot, and I never could make up my mind what I wanted to do."

During his early years on Tour, Ben was not known for his driving skills. He worked hard on that aspect of his game, and now has no particular problems off the tee. His putting touch has always been extraordinary.

For awhile, it looked as if he would pull a repeat of 1980, and win his final start of the year. He did a hole a tough 20-foot par-saving putt on the final hole to tie Bill Rogers in the Texas Open in San Antonio, but lost the playoff.

Shaking his head, he said, "I'm not worth a damn in playoffs. I'm 0-for-5 now. They really make me nervous."

Earlier in the year, he was in a five-way playoff in the Bing Crosby National Pro-Am, but couldn't get past the first extra hole as John Cook finally defeated Hale Irwin on the third.

His improved driving and steady putting has helped Ben become more consistent, and last year he had nine top 10 finishes in 25 starts.

He joined the Tour in the Fall of 1973 after compiling an excellent amateur record. He won the NCAA Championship three straight years for the University of Texas, although he shared it in 1972 with teammate Tom Kite.

Ben earned his Tour card in the Fall of 1973, gaining medalist honors by an incredible 12 strokes over runner-up Gil Morgan. In his first start, the San Antonio-Texas Open, he won by two over Orville Moody. The next event was the 144-hole \$500,000 World Open at Pinehurst, and he finished second to Miller Barber.

His most productive year was 1976, when he won three times and collected a career high of \$257,759, finishing second on the money list.

Although Dave Eichelberger did gain the fourth victory of his Tour career in 1981, he did not enjoy the season-long success that was his the year before.

The victory came in the Tallahassee Open, as he defeated Bob Murphy and Mark O'Meara in a playoff with a birdie on the first extra hole. Moments earlier, Dave missed a three footer for a birdie at the 18th that would have given him the title in regulation play.

One of the busiest veterans on the Tour, he was in 35 tournaments last year. The year before, he played in 33, so this lanky Texan never gives his clubs a chance to cool down.

Dave started in the game at age 13 in the junior programs at his family's club in Waco, Texas. However, it wasn't until he went to Oklahoma State that his game started to blossom. He reached the semifinals on the 1964 U.S. Amateur at Canterbury and the next year, represented Uncle Sam on the Walker Cup and Americas Cup team.

He came out of the Tour's Qualifying School in 1967 and steadily worked his way toward a \$108,312 year in 1971 that included a victory in the Greater Milwaukee Open. He admits that for the next few years, he may not have worked hard enough on his game, but he gained victory again in 1977 in Milwaukee.

His game always seemed to have peaks and valleys. Long off the tee and an excellent iron player, it seemed to depend on his putting.

In March of 1980, he had everything working as he mastered the cold wind to win the Bay Hill Classic near Orlando. He admitted that he put his Texas-born knowledge of the low punch shot to good use that week.

In 1980, Dave ran away with Eagle honors in the statistical program, making 16 of them. It prompted the question, "How many Eichels does Eagleberger have?"

This past year, the eagles were a little more difficult to catch. He finished the year with six. He had two of them at Tallahassee, though, making it possible for him to claim another victory.

Lee Elder has enjoyed a successful career on the TPA TOUR, winning four times and representing his country in the 1979 Ryder Cup matches at the Greenbrier.

His first triumph was a memorable one. It came in the 1974 Monsanto Open at the Pensacola Country Club. He birdied three of the last four holes to catch Peter Oosterhuis and then won with an 18-foot birdie putt on the fourth extra hole. The triumph earned Lee his first trip to the Augusta National Golf Club for the 1975 Masters Tournament.

His biggest year was 1978, when he had a blazing streak in mid-summer. He tied with Lee Trevino in the Greater Milwaukee Open, and the playoff lasted for eight holes before winning. A month later, he birdied the final hole in the Westchester Classic to edge Mark Hayes by one.

Elder qualified for the Tour in the Fall of 1967. In his first year, he created considerable excitement as he tied Frank Beard and Jack Nicklaus at the end of regulation play in the American Golf Classic at Firestone Country Club. Beard was eliminated on the first extra hole, but Lee carried Jack to the fifth extra hole before bowing out.

Many years ago, Lee injured a knee playing football and in recent years, it has caused him problems. Several times, he has been forced to withdraw in order to have fluid drained from the joint. This was especially true in 1980.

In the Fall of 1979, he enjoyed one of his greatest moments in the game. His fine play in 1978 earned him a position on the Ryder Cup team. That was one of his life-long goals and the one experience he said he never will forget.

For the last 11 years, he has hosted the Lee Elder Celebrity Pro-Am tournament and all proceeds go to the Lee Elder Scholarship Foundation. The goal each year is to issue college grants to 12 worthy recipients. The last three events have been held at the Langston Golf Club in northeast Washington, D.C.

Lee is using his position in career earnings for his year-long exemption in 1982. A slow start in 1981 cost him a chance to move in among the top 60 money winners, as he missed cuts in seven of his first 14 starts; and then went 11 straight tournaments without missing one. A tie for third in the Atlanta Classic was the highlight of the year.

Keith Fergus generally was regarded as the finest player on the Tour without a victory — until his big day at the end of May last year when he won the Memorial Tournament on the demanding Muirfield Village course in Ohio.

"I wondered what it would feel like to win," he said, "and often wondered if it really was worth the effort. Now, I can tell you it is worth it. I've played well enough to win the last couple of years."

Keith, an All-American choice at the University of Houston for three years, had gone $4\frac{1}{2}$ years without tasting victory, and "I've always believed winning is what sports is all about. You have to forget about the money, because if you win and play well, the money will be there."

The key to his victory, he believes, was his concentration. He doesn't recall when it has ever been better, and on a course such as Muirfield, concentration is what it is all about.

Once again, Fergus improved on his record as each year he has been on Tour, he has increased his money winnings. In the spring, he had a splendid tournament at the Doral-Eastern Open, and tied for second with David Graham, one behind Raymond Floyd.

Keith started to play golf at age eight. "My Dad played a lot," he recalls, "and I would go out and caddy for him." He says his father and Lee Williams, the head pro at Killeen Municipal Course, helped him with his game through the early stages.

He played football and basketball through the first couple of years in high school, "but I started to concentrate on golf after that." He said he realized he enjoyed practicing golf more than he did practicing the other sports.

He won the Texas State Junior championship in 1971 and was runner-up in the state high school tournament the following year. He went to the University of Houston and gained All-American status. In the summer of 1975, he lost to Fred Ridley in the final of the United States Amateur.

He believes the strongest part of his game is his driving. "I found out a long time ago that it is easier to make par or birdie from the middle of the fairway than it is from the trees." Generally, he prefers to draw the ball, although he can work it both ways.

Even after he was medalist in the Fall Qualifying School of 1977, there were some who wondered if Ed Fiori had the talents to do well on the TPA TOUR. They wonder no more.

This young man with a confident swagger can play. His grip may be a little unorthodox for a touring professional, but Ed has increased his winnings each year, reaching a high of \$105,510 last year.

He knows how to win, too, and that is the name of this game. In 1979, he was tied with Tom Weiskopf in the Southern Open, and he defeated the talented veteran on the second extra hole.

Last year, he started in the Western Open with a 74, and then played brilliantly through the last three rounds on the tough Butler National course to win by four strokes. He shot 67-69-67 for an 11-under par 277.

He laughed about it later. "Honestly, the odds on me winning had to be 90 to 1, I had been playing so bad." He added, "That was the best I have ever played and the last round of 67 certainly was the best I've ever played under pressure."

The stocky Fiori started in the game at age seven. "We lived next to a course in Downey, Calif., and I used to sneak through the strands of barbed wire to play. About twice a week, they would catch me and my pal and chase us off. A neighbor had given me a few clubs to use."

After high school, Ed started to work at odd jobs around southern California, mainly in construction work. He also found enough time to play considerable golf, "wherever I could find a game."

One of those golf excursions took him to a tournament in Guadalajara, Mexico. He birdied the last four holes to get into a playoff with Craig Stadler and Jack Renner. Stadler won the playoff, but a University of Houston alumnus was there and was impressed. He recommended him to the Cougars.

"I had been out of high school for four years, so I went to Wharton Junior college for a semester, sat out a semester and then transferred to Houston."

His second year, the Cougars won the NCAA team title, and Ed was named to the All-American team. "Until then, I had not thought much about joining the TPA TOUR, but that was all the guys on the team talked about . . . getting on the Tour."

He dropped out of Houston in the spring of 1977, played in a few mini-Tour events and then headed for the Q-School.

Like fine wine, Raymond Floyd simply gets better with the passing of time. He had a superb year in 1980, but it pales in comparison to the one he had in 1981.

He was the No. 2 money winner to Tom Kite with \$359,360 and when you compare that to his previous best-ever year in 1980 when he won \$192,993, you can bring the picture into sharper focus.

In addition, since he won two tournaments back-to-back — the Doral-Eastern Open and the prestigious Tournament Players Championship — he collected an extra \$200,000 as part of the Florida bonus package. That took his earnings from the U.S. Tour to \$559,360.

In mid-June, he won the Manufacturers Hanover-Westchester Classic, and twice he finished second, once after a playoff against Bruce Lietzke in the Wickes-Andy Williams San Diego Open.

Even Ray was at a loss to explain it fully. He did say that at no time in his splendid career, has he ever been able to sustain such a long period of excellent ball-striking and tunnelled concentration.

He made the 36-hole cut in all 23 of his starts and compiled an impressive list of 14 finishes among the top 10. Few in the game have ever been more consistent.

Floyd grew up in Ft. Bragg, N. C., the son of an Army man who now is co-owner of the Cypress Lakes Golf Club in Fayetteville. Although he was exposed to golf at an early age, Ray chose to pursue baseball until he won the National Jaycees Golf title in 1960. He turned pro the following year, joined the Tour in 1963 and won the St. Petersburg Open as a rookie. At age 20 years and six months, he was the third youngest ever to win on Tour.

There have been numerous highlights to his career, but the most notable probably was the 1976 Masters Tournament. He won by eight strokes, and his total of 17-under par 271 equaled the tournament record set by Nicklaus in 1965.

If there were such a category as "most comebacks from surgery" in the all-time TPA TOUR records, Al Geiberger would be leading it by such a wide margin that no one would ever catch him.

Yet, this lanky fellow keeps smiling and telling everyone that what has happened is history, and it's just great to be able to play on the Tour again. One wonders how brilliant a record he would have had if he had been healthy for the past decade.

First, it was a nervous stomach disorder that nearly ended his career late in the 1960's and early 1970's. He battled back from that to win the 1974 Sahara Invitational, ending a victory drought of more than eight years.

Just when his long irons were whistling with incredible accuracy, he was struck down again early in 1978 when he needed intestinal surgery, and then late in 1979 with knee surgery. Seemingly healthy again, he suffered a severe attack while in Vail, Colo., for the Jerry Ford Invitational in July of 1980 and emergency surgery had to be performed for the removal of his colon. In all, he underwent three separate operations in approximately two months for an illostemy.

As long as golf is played, Al will be remembered for the afternoon at the Colonial Country Club during the 1977 Danny Thomas-Memphis Classic when he became the first player ever to break 60 in a TPA TOUR event. He had a 13-under par 59. It came on June 10, during the second round and was a master blend of 11 birdies and one eagle. He used only 23 putts in the 30-29 effort, culminating in an eight footer for a birdie on the final hole.

He went on to win the tournament, although he had to hold off late challenges by Gary Player and Jerry McGee to do it.

Over the years, he has done well on the toughest tracks, such as Firestone Country Club in winning the 1965 American Golf Classic and the 1966 PGA Championship; 1975 Tournament Players Championship and the 1979 Colonial National Invitation, both at the Colonial Country Club in Fort Worth; and the 1976 Western Open at the Butler National.

Gibby Gilbert came within a putt of making the top 60 money list for the 10th time in his career. As it turned out, he finished in 61st place, only \$156 behind the 60th man, Vance Heafner, and Vance had to birdie the final two holes of the year's final event in Pensacola to slip past Gibby.

He is exempt this year, since he has won well over \$800,000 during his 14 years on Tour, placing him 46th on the all-time list.

Once again, Gibby's best finish was in the Manufacturers Hanover-Westchester Classic. For the second straight year, he was second, prompting him to comment, "I wish we could play Westchester every week. I don't know what it is, but I always seem to play well there.

Part of it is concentration. "That's never been one of my strong suits," he says, pointing out how it is far better some weeks than others. "There isn't any question about it; that's the one thing that makes the great players what they are."

Despite the lack of a given name — it's C. L. Gilbert, Jr. — Gibby began to make a name for himself in golf early in his native Chattanooga. He started in the game at age 13. He left the University of Chattanooga in 1962 to be married, and later accepted a job as assistant professional in Hollywood, Fla.

He went to the Qualifying School in 1967 and finished second to Bobby Cole. It was $2\frac{1}{2}$ years later that he won his first event, the Houston Champions International in a playoff over Bruce Crampton. Even today, he'll tell you "I wasn't a good player when I won then," but he certainly has become one since then.

In 1972, he suffered a setback, and finished 73rd on the money list. Faced with non-exempt status, he thought seriously about leaving the Tour, but stuck with it for one more year. He won \$60,636 in 1973 for 48th place, and he has been a steady performer ever since. Only one other year did he drop from the top 60, and that was in 1977. He suffered rib injuries in the spring, and missed almost all of the summer tournaments. However, he retained his exempt status when he joined with Grier Jones late in the year and they won the Walt Disney World National Team title.

A highlight of his career came in 1973 at the World Open. He set a course-record 62 on Pinehurst No. 2. It shattered the best previous mark by three strokes.

Except for a five-tournament stretch in early summer, Bob Gilder turned in another consistent year. Only, this time, he found it difficult to muster many strong finishes.

Thanks to a final-round 66, he did tie for fourth in the PGA Championship and he only had two other top 10s. Bob made the cut in 23 events last year as compared to 18 the year before, but he only made about half as much money.

Winning the Canadian Open Championship was a highlight of 1980 and he did it during a week when he felt he was not playing that well. "That's a good feeling," he said, "to know you can win when you are not at your best."

His victory ended a 4½-year drought, but he said it didn't bother him to go that long without grabbing the brass ring. "I have different goals than some players," he explained. "I'm not a superstar, and I don't know if I want to be. I don't care for all the extra attention and publicity that goes with it. Sure, I want to be a very good player and recognized by my fellow players as one, but I also want to enjoy my privacy with my family."

Bob starred for the Arizona State University golf team — winning the 19⁷3 Western Atheltic Conference title — and was a teammate of Howard Twitty and Tom Purtzer. After he was graduated in 1973, he tried for his Tour card three times without success. Meanwhile, in 1974, he won the New Zealand Open in a playoff over Jack Newton and Bob Charles.

In the Fall of 1975, he did earn his playing privileges.

In his first start of 1976, he missed the cut in the Tucson Open. The next week at the Phoenix Country Club, he overtook Roger Maltbie the final afternoon to win by two strokes.

He became only the fourth first-year player to win more than \$100,000, and would have been the "rookie-of-the-year," if Jerry Pate had not won the U.S. and Canadian Opens and \$153,102.

Normally an excellent striker of the ball, he has the ability to move his shots in either direction and, that, he says, "is an excellent feeling because you can't always play the same shot."

When David Graham picked up his first set of golf clubs — and a left-handed set, at that — there was no way that he could envision himself as the United Stated Open champion and the winner of well over \$1 million.

He reached both of those goals last year, though, and David is another one of those players who seems to get better with the years.

Last June at Merion in the Open championship, he trailed George Burns by three strokes after three rounds. He then played what many have called one of the finest finishing rounds in the history of the tournament. He shot a three-under par 67 for a total of seven-under 273, one stroke better than Burns and Bill Rogers.

As Rogers said at the awards ceremony, "David Graham hit 18 greens in regulation and in the last round of the U.S. Open, that is unbelievable."

Earlier in the year, he had another first. He started his season at the Phoenix Open, and won by a stroke over Lon Hinkle. Not many of his seven victories have been easy. His first was in the 1972 Cleveland Open and he had to defeat his close friend, Bruce Devlin, in a playoff.

When he won the PGA Championship in 1979, he was cruising and then he double bogeyed the 18th hole to let Ben Crenshaw tie him. He won it with a birdie on the third extra hole.

In the Memorial Tournament two years ago, Tom Watson was headed for an apparent victory, but David won it with a 30-foot birdie putt at the 18th.

Winning the PGA, he says, changed him as a player and a person. "I felt I was rather tense prior to that. I found the game difficult, but after the PGA, I realized I may have been selling myself short. I gained more composure, more self-control and I'm now more relaxed."

David was only 14-years old when he found the left-handed clubs in his garage in Windsor, Australia. He played with them for two years before making the switch to righthanded. As a 16-year old, he worked in a golf shop in Melbourne and, after a three-year apprenticeship, took a head job at a nine-hole course in Tasmania.

He came back to Australia $2\nu_2$ -years later and worked for a club manufacturer and it was there that his love for designing clubs began.

Late in the 1960's, he embarked on the tournament circuit, first through Australia and the Far East. It was a road that has taken him to the very top.

Lou Graham would like to be able to go through a year without any physical ailments. After the last two, it would be a great feeling.

Coming off a brilliant year in 1979 when he won three times, he suffered through a series of ailments in 1980 such as back aches and groin muscle pulls, plus an illness to one of his daughters.

Last year, his back problems continued until May, and just when he was starting to feel fit again, he cracked a rib at the PGA Championship in August.

As a result, he only won \$33,958 last year and that was his lowest total since 1969. His only top 10 finish was a tie for seventh in the Tallahassee Open.

Lou gave several classic performances in 1979. The first part of the year was not vintage Graham, at all, but a final-round 64 at Whitemarsh Valley in the IVB-Philadelphia Classic let him tie Bobby Wadkins, and then he won the playoff.

Five weeks later, he edged Ben Crenshaw by one in the Pleasant Valley Classic. Late in the fall, at the San Antonio-Texas Open, he won again by one shot, this time over three others.

Even Lou could not explain why he won only three times in 15 years, and then suddenly won three times in a matter of eight weeks.

His biggest victory will remain the 1975 United States Open at Medinah in Chicago. He was tied with John Mahaffey at the end of regulation play, and the next day won the playoff, 71 to 73. That triumph gave him a 10-year exemption from qualifying for al TPA TOUR co-sponsored events, and since he dropped from the rolls of the top 60 in 1980 for the first time since 1969, he used the Open exemption for 1981. He will do the same in 1982.

The only reason he was out of the top 60 in 1969 was because he missed a large portion of the year due to surgery to repair tendonitis in his left hand.

Lou turned professional after his discharge from the Army in 1962 and worked at two golf clubs near Baltimore before starting on Tour in 1964. One of the more consistent players in the game for many years, he was named to three United States Ryder CLp teams.

Hubert Green knows now that it isn't necessary for him to hit the golf ball higher and longer to be a winner. He tried to make a few swing changes in 1980 to accomplish those results, and ended up with his poorest year in nearly a decade.

"It wasn't right for me," he said, "but it was something I had to try."

It took him awhile to get the feel of the old one back, but when he did, he won for the 17th time in his fine career, winning the Sammy Davis, Jr.-Greater Hartford Open by a stroke over three players. He was three behind Roger Maltbie starting the last round, and then threw a 64 at the field for the victory.

That led the way for another \$100,000-plus season, his eighth in the last nine years.

With the old swing, Hubert was devastating and certainly one of the outstanding players in the world. He had a stretch in the 1976 when he won three straight tournaments — the Doral-Eastern Open, the Greater Jacksonville Open and the Heritage Classic.

The next year, he won the United States Open in a gutty performance at Southern Hills in Tulsa. While his swing may have appeared a little unorthodox, it was highly effective.

Hubert started to swing a club at age five, but as he was going through the teen years, he played all sports. "My father was a believer in sports," he says. "He wanted me to play them all, but as I became older, I eliminated one after the other as I realized I wasn't good enough or big enough to play them."

As a result, he began to concentrate more on golf and during his high school days spent considerable time during the summer months playing in the many special invitationals held throughout his native Alabama. The next step was Florida State University.

He turned professional in 1970 and worked for a summer as an assistant pro at Merion Golf Club in Ardmore, Pa. He qualified for his Tour card in the fall of that year.

Success came quickly. In the Houston Champions Invitational, he tied Don January and then birdied the first extra hole for the victory. He was named the "rookie-of-the-year."

Jay Haas has won three times since he started on Tour in 1977, and in each case, he took the lead after the second round and then led the rest of the way.

This past year, he blossomed as a full-fledged star, winning twice and earning \$181,894. He has learned his lessons well from Uncle Bob Goalby.

In the Greater Milwaukee Open, he opened with 68-66, and led by two. He breezed from there to win by three over Chi Chi Rodriguez. In the B.C. Open, he started with 67-65, and went on to hold off Tom Kite for another three-stroke margin.

During his second year on Tour, it was a second-round 64 that started his drive to the Andy Williams-San Diego Open title.

With Goalby as his uncle, it was a foregone conclusion that Jay would become a professional golfer. Bob started him early, and has helped him through every stage of his career.

"I was about five years old when I started to swing a golf club," Jay recalls. With a wide grin, he went on, "Bob had a club that was broken in half, so it actually was about my size. He put a grip on it, and that was the start. It wasn't long after that he put several more clubs together."

Jay was seven when he played his first tournament — and won his first trophy. It was the National Pee Wee Championship in Orlando, Fla. "We played five holes each day and I scored 26-26—52 to finish third," he said.

Under the tutelage of Goalby, Jay went on to win the Illinois state high school championship in 1972 and then headed for Wake Forest. His junior year was the big one. "I had one stretch when I played some of the best golf of my life," he said. It started with him winning three of his Walker Cup matches, then advancing to the fifth round of the British Amateur; the third week he was low amateur in the U.S. Open at Medinah; and finally, he won the NCAA championship at Ohio State University.

He earned his Tour card in the Qualifying School in the Fall of 1976. He said of his rookie year: "It probably was not as good as I had hoped for, but as I look back at it, I realize it wasn't too bad at all."

Dan Halldorson has established himself firmly as the finest Canadian player on the TPA TOUR since George Knudson was winning a decade ago.

He had an excellent 1980 campaign, winning the Pensacola Open and more than \$111,000, and he backed it up with another solid performance in 1981. After his Pensacola triumph, he joined with Jim Nelford and they won the World Cup for their native Canada.

In his first start of 1981, he equaled the course record in the Joe Garagiola-Tucson Open with a first-round 63, and went on to finish third. That gave him a good foundation upon which to build another good year.

He came close to victory in the Quad Cities Open, but, interestingly enough, lost in a playoff to another Canadian, Dave Barr. There were three other players involved.

Dan first qualified for the Tour in the Fall of 1974, but he only won \$619 in 1975 and lost his card. He spent the next three years playing all across Canada. "I knew my game wasn't good enough for the Tour," he said.

He won a few times and piled up a number of second-place finishes, but decided in 1978 that he wasn't going anywhere in the game while playing in his homeland. He wanted another shot at the U.S. Tour.

He made it through the Qualifying School, and early in 1979, he tasted success. After two rounds of the Hawaiian Open, he was tied for the lead with Fuzzy Zoeller and George Burns, but finally tied for seventh.

Even though he finished 116th on the 1979 money list, he believed the top 60 in 1980 was a realistic goal. After he finished second to Jim Colbert in the Joe Garagiola-Tucson Open, winning \$32,400, he knew it was.

He already was assured of exempt status for 1981 with a position among the top 60 money winners when he headed for Pensacola. After two rounds of 68-67 at Perdido Bay, he was tied with Gary Hallberg and Tom Kite at nine-under 135. A 70 the third day left him three in back of Bob Mann, but his final-round 70 was all he needed to regain the lead.

The Halldorson family lived across the street from a golf course in Winnipeg, so he started in the game at an early age. He even built his practice range in his back yard.

In his home province, he has won the Manitoba Juniors, the Manitoba PGA and twice the Manitoba Open.

Morris Hatalsky is a classic example of what rewards will come your way with hard work, patience and faith.

He has experienced his highs and lows during his years on the TPA TOUR, but he knew it was not going to be easy. After all, as he points out, "I was in five Qualifying Schools before I made it," in the Spring of 1976.

Last September, he reaped the rewards of his dedication, winning the Hall of Fame Classic on the classic No. 2 Course at Pinehurst. He led after the first round with a superb six-under par 65. He lost the lead to Jerry Pate the second day, but regained it for keeps after the third round and went on to win by two strokes over Pate and D. A. Weibring.

The victory was not a total surprise to him, even though he had won only a little over \$25,000 to that point. "I had made eight straight cuts before I missed by a stroke the week before Pinehurst," he said. "My game was pretty solid, even though the scores might not have reflected it."

Morris started in golf at age 10 after his brother gave him a set of clubs. "I fell in love with the game right away," he said. Living in San Diego, it wasn't long until he was competing on the junior level and winning. At age 17, for example, he won the Mexico National Junior title, and in 1969, was the San Diego high school golfer of the year.

He said, "One of the biggest thrills of my life came after I won a junior tournament in San Diego, and they introduced me to Billy Casper."

After two years at Arizona State University, he transferred to the United States International University and continued to play well.

During his first full year on the Tour, in 1977, he finished second to Dave Eichelberger in the Greater Milwaukee Open. He had a chance to win, but recalls, "I was so nervous, I didn't have control of my game."

He admits the next year was a "disaster. I realized I had no firm foundation to my game but relied on my chipping and putting."

At the end of the year, he went to Ken Venturi for help and the improvement was immediate. "I was committed to stay on Tour as long as I could," he said, "but it wasn't a case of winning then; it was a case of making money."

Venturi changed the fundamentals of his swing and his thoughts about how to play the game. The records tell the rest of the story.

Mark Hayes started to play golf at age six, under the watchful eye of his father, a high school physical education teacher and golf coach.

Since that time. Mark has gone about his way, dedicating himself to succeeding in the game, and he has been successful. His biggest victory came in the 1977 Tournament Players Championship at Sawgrass, and with it, a 10-year exemption from qualifying on the Tour.

At the age of 13, the family returned to Stillwater, where Mark was born and there he came under the tutelage of Labron Harris, Sr., the Oklahoma State University coach and a close friend of Mark's Dad.

"One of the reasons I was so dedicated to the game," Mark says, "was that I was small for my age and I couldn't do anything else well. I practiced every day. I never thought about doing anything else for a living but playing golf."

One highlight of his blossoming career came in the annual Texas vs. Oklahoma Junior matches, and he defeated Tom Kite in the final.

During his years at Stillwater High and Oklahoma State, he was a teammate of Doug Tewell, and it was Mark who eventually convinced Doug that he should play the Tour for a living, and not work in a pro shop.

After leaving college, he went into the Army for two years and spent most of his time at Fort Jackson, S. C., working in the golf shop. There at the same time was Joe Inman.

He arrived on the Tour in the Fall of 1973 and broke through with two victories in 1976. He led the Byron Nelson Classic from wire-to-wire and closed the year with a victory in the Pensacola Open.

This past year, Mark's closest brush with victory came in the Greater Greensboro Open. He was leading Larry Nelson by two, approaching the final green, but Nelson made a near impossible bunker shot for a birdie, and Mark, stunned by the turn of events, made bogey from the back fringe. Larry won it all with a birdie on the second extra hole of their playoff.

A three-time All-American at North Carolina State, Vance Heafner had justifiably big expectations when he turned pro in 1978 and tried to earn his TPA TOUR card. Several frustrating experiences in Qualifying Schools, however, delayed his start until June of 1980. But his 1981 season demonstrated fully the potential that observers had noted during his amateur career, when he won the 1977 Porter Cup and the 1976 and 1978 Eastern Amateur titles, among others.

The strapping six-footer, who is the son of the late Clayton Heafner, a noted player in the 1940's and 50's, got his feet wet with earnings of \$11,398 in 18 tournament over the last half of the 1980 season. He was aiming directly at an exempt Top 60 spot as the 1981 season opened — and he reached that goal in dramatic fashion in the season's last two weeks.

Indeed, it came down to the last two holes at the Pensacola Open, where he ran home birdie putts to tie for 10th place, earning the \$4,433 which lifted him past Gibby Gilbert into the 60th and final exempt position.

"I think every player aims at the Top 60 in his first year. I'm not really a goal-oriented person, but I have to say that those last two weeks of the season were the most exciting and enjoyable times I've had in golf," he said.

For the record, Heafner made the heroic Pensacola finish possible by tying for sixth place the week prior at the Southern Open, earning \$6,700 to get into position for the 11th-hour run for the exemption. The entire season, really, was an exercise in thorough dedication as the Charlotte, NC, native competed in 37 of a possible 41 events — and he missed one event due to a friend's wedding and another to a minor injury.

"I think I appreciate the Top 60 spot more than most because of the way I earned it," he said, in what may rank as one of golf's major understatements.

Heafner's enthusiasm about his Top 60 spot carried over into the next week, where he and partner Mike Holland ran off with the Walt Disney World National Team Championship. They won with a record-breaking score of 42-under par 246, leaving the second-place team five shots back. As Clayton Heafner's son, his exposure to golf was early. But with his father's death, when

As Clayton Heafner's son, his exposure to golf was early. But with his father's death, when Vance was six years old, his athletic interests broadened, and he became a better-than-average high school basketball and football player. Golf continually beckoned, however, and he gave up the other sports to concentrate on golf in his senior year, a decision for which he was rewarded with a golf scholarship to North Carolina State.

His college coach, Richard Sykes, and then Roger Watson, became the guiding forces in his playing career. Watson, especially, helped the young Heafner build a game which has proven capable of success on the TPA TOUR — and he still visits with Watson regularly. Watson is the general manager at MacGregor Downs in Cary, NC, which Heafner represents on Tour.

"Looking back at 1981, I feel that I've turned the corner. For a while, I missed everything by one shot. I missed getting my card by one shot twice. I was missing cuts by one, missing qualifying by one. But I stuck with it, and the finish at Pensacola was the really big turnaround. I think I'm going to enjoy 1982," he smiled.

When you look at the TPA TOUR record of Lon Hinkle, you have to believe it was compiled by two different men. In his first five years he won a grand total of \$40,876. In the next year alone, he easily surpassed that total, and since then, he has topped the century mark each year with a high of \$247,693 in 1979.

"Early in my career," he says, "my goals were too low. My main goal was to survive. When things would go bad over here, I'd bail out and go overseas to find an easier game."

On one of those trips, he met Edith, a Swiss beauty, and she gave him a new purpose to life. Since then, his career has shot straight for the stars.

While his first victory was in the 1978 New Orleans Open, he had his biggest year in 1979, winning the Bing Crosby National Pro-Am in a playoff over Mark Hayes and Andy Bean. He also won the World Series of Golf, outlasting Larry Nelson to the wire.

Lon's father is an associate professor in Literature at San Diego State University, and Lon started in the game of golf at age 13, shortly after the family moved from Granville, Ohio, to San Diego. He'd play golf every day.

There are seven Hinkle children and in the early days, it wasn't unusual for all of them to be competing in junior golf tournaments around southern California.

Lon received a mental boost in 1980 when he finished third to Jack Nicklaus in the United States Open and PGA Championships. Although Jack won both by comfortable margins, Lon learned in those two experiences that he could win the significant championships.

In 1981, he started the year by finishing as the runner-up in two of the first three tournaments — to Johnny Miller in the Joe Garagiola-Tucson Open and to David Graham in the Phoenix Open, thanks to a last-day 63.

His biggest enjoyment of the year, however, came in the National Long Drive contest. He won with a belt of 338 yards, six inches and became the first Tour player ever to win it.

There was a short time — maybe three weeks — during which Mike Holland didn't know whether or not he liked golf. That's how long it took him to go from a back-yard introduction to the game by a 10-year-old classmate who had been playing two years to beating that friend on the nine-hole course in Bishopsville.

"I guess the game came pretty natural for me, ' said Holland, looking back over 15 years of steady progress in golf since that backyard introduction. "When you're the first member of your family to take up the game, you don't really know what all the possibilities are, but maybe that was good," he said.

What did transpire was that Holland became a very solid high school player, solid enough to earn a golf scholarship to the University of South Carolina, where he decided his skills warranted a serious consideration of golf as a career.

It was during his junior year at South Carolina that Holland went through several minor changes in his game which, in the final analysis, gave him the opportunity to become a truly fine player.

"Being largely self-taught, I did have several minor things in my swing which were not quite right. I had a nice sophomore season and was playing pretty well, but to advance, I had to go through a transition period, and I was fortunate to have Grant Bennet, from Columbia (SC) to oversee that process. He gave me a solid foundation."

"Another factor in my development, I think, was the fact that I did not have any great successes early. I was a pretty consistent top-ten finisher in college, but I didn't win. That made me hungry, and I probably needed to be that way since I tend to be too easy-going," he smiled.

After All-American honors in 1978, coming on the heels of the 1976 South Carolina Amateur Championship, which he won during his successful sophomore season, he turned professional and headed for Tour Qualifying.

Holland gained his card in the Spring of 1980 and earned only \$1,961 in 16 events over the last half of the year. But he felt he was making progress, and began to show it during 1981.

Holland's length and accuracy off the tee, where he plays a slight fade a la Bruce Lietzke, put him in position for a tie for 33rd at the Sea Pines Heritage Classic. And two months later, he was cashing his first four-figure check — one for \$7,350 as he tied for ninth in the Michelob-Houston Open, opening with rounds of 66 and 67.

He wrapped up the season with another solid tournament, tying for 10th in the Pensacola Open, and that event served as a springboard for both he and partner Vance Heafner in the Walt Disney World Team Championship. They went into the event on a high note, got the first-round lead and were never headed.

Holland credits Bert Yancey with guidance and improvement of his short-game skills and Carl Tyner with refinements of his swing on the foundation Grant Bennett provided as key factors in his much-improved play on the TPA TOUR in 1981. And he firmly believes there are plenty of high moments to come in the years ahead.

There are few players in the game with more pride and competitive spirit than Hale Irwin. It was never more evident than in 1981.

Hale had been through a year without winning, and his earnings for 1980 were only \$109,810. For a player such as Irwin, ONLY is correct.

"It hurt my pride," he said. With a laugh, he added, "You have to tell yourself you're not immortal. You're not sitting on Zeus' throne, but while you are up there, you can believe you really are sitting there; and it's a good feeling."

So, Hale says he went back to work on his game, and the results were vintage Irwin — and better. He won twice, in the Hawaiian Open setting a tournament record along the way; and in the Buick Open. He lost another, the Bing Crosby National Pro-Am, in a playoff to John Cook and had three other second-place finishes.

When the year closed, he had a career high of \$276,499.

The last few years, Hale has been spending more time with his family and will play the bulk of his schedule during the first six months of the year. The problem is, as he admits, "You have to play to be competitive."

As a result, his victory in the Buick was somewhat unexpected, even by Hale, but that week, his driving and putting were solid. "I've also learned that I can play better when I'm ready to play. At the Buick, I was ready because I had spent time with the family."

Irwin joined the Tour in June of 1968. A graduate of the University of Colorado, he won the 1967 NCAA title for the Buffaloes. He also was named twice to the All-Big Eight football team as a defensive back.

His first victory was in the 1971 Heritage Classic, but two of the highest points of his career came in triumphs in the 1974 U.S. Open at Winged Foot and the 1979 Open at Inverness.

Perhaps his greatest performance came in the 1977 Hall of Fame Classic on the Pinehurst No. 2 course. He won by five strokes with an amazing 20-under par 264.

His record of consistency, except for 1980, is incredible. He went from early in 1975 through the 1978 schedule — covering 86 tournaments — without missing a 36-hole cut. That's the third best streak in Tour history.

For most of 1981, Peter Jacobsen was doing his best to try and imitate the Peter Jacobsen he knew in 1980, but it wasn't easy.

One of the bright young stars on the TPA TOUR, Peter had more than his share of physical problems last year, starting with an operation on his vocal cords in late February. Then came a series of illnesses and a problem with his back that had him sidelined for several weeks at a time through the late spring and summer.

He was super-charged, though, when he returned to the site of his lone Tour victory. That was at Warwick Hills in Grand Blanc, Mich., where he won the 1980 Buick-Goodwrench Open. Peter played marvelously again in 1981, and worked his way into a four-way playoff that eventually was won by Hale Irwin.

The B.C. Open is another of his favorites and he went there bouyed by his Buick success, but had to withdraw after one round due to the sore back. He was off for more than a month, and came back for the Southern Open to finish fourth.

It was frustrating, to say the least; just as it was during his early years on Tour. Although he progressed steadily in his first three years, he said it was discouraging because, "I knew I was as good as some of those who were winning, but I tried to be patient."

Peter started in the game at age 12. His father taught him the fundamentals, and his older brother, David, also helped considerably. "They are about the only teachers I've ever had," he says.

He went to the University of Oregon and won the PAC-8 Conference championship in 1974. He was named to the collegiate All-America team three years. In 1976, he won the Oregon Open and the Northern California Open.

"I didn't know how good I was, really," he says, "because I had not played that much amateur golf nationally."

Nevertheless, he qualified for the Tour the first time he tried, in the Fall of 1976. He has been on the rise ever since.

Along with his playing skills, Peter also is in demand for clinics and exhibitions, and especially, to do his skits imitating other players. "I used to do some of that stuff in high school," he said. "I enjoy doing it, and I know it has helped me to relax in front of people. From that standpoint, I know it has helped me on the course playing in front of people."

It still is easy for Barry Jaeckel to look back and think about what might have been. If he had made one more putt in the final round of the 1981 Tournament Players Championship at Sawgrass, he would be sitting comfortable with a 10-year exemption from qualifying for all TPA TOUR events.

As it was, Jaeckel was forced into a sudden-death playoff with Raymond Floyd and Curtis Strange and Floyd won it all with a par on the first extra hole.

Barry did use the \$35,000 he won at Sawgrass as the cornerstone to his best money year, \$87,931, and a return to the top 60 on the money list. The only other year since starting in the Spring of 1975 that he has had a year-long exemption was in 1978 when he won the Tallahassee Open in a playoff over Bruce Lietzke.

Barry has a slightly-unorthodox swing pattern and it requires constant attention. It is difficult for him to maintain consistency, but when he has it grooved, he can play very well. His short game is excellent.

Jaeckel had a one-stroke lead after two rounds of the TPC, and increased it to three after three days. A rain-out on Sunday may have stopped his momentum, as he came back with a 74 on Monday.

"I don't feel I lost," the classy Jaeckel said. "A great player beat me (Floyd shot a final-round 68) and a great player tied me. I'll go away smiling." And, he did.

The handsome Californian started in the game in rather unusual fashion. 'I visted a friend's house when I was a kid. I don't remember how old I was, but he had this golf club. It felt good to swing and I thought I'd like to try the game.''

He went on to make his high school golf team, and played most of his golf at the famed Riviera Country Club, where his parents were members. His first important title was the 1968 Southern California Amateur and he was runner-up in the 1971 Pacific Coast Amateur.

After turning professional in 1971, he played the mini-tours and overseas, winning the 1972 French Open. He attempted to qualify for the Tour, but missed four times before succeeding in June of 1975.

He is the son of Richard Jaeckel, a character actor who has had roles in dozens of movies and many television series.

Don January was one of golf's more consistent performers for many years, and now he is playing the same role on the Seniors Tour, while still being very competitive in his few appearances on the regular Tour.

He only played in eight TPA TOUR events in 1981 and collected a tidy sum of \$53,747. A nice portion of that came when he finished alone in second place to Hale Irwin in the Hawaiian Open.

Later in the spring, he tied for seventh in the Colonial National Invitation.

Federal Savings Classic.

On the Seniors Tour, though, he won twice and always seemed to be near the lead in the others. When he started on the circuit for the gentlemen over 50 years, he let them know he was around. He won the PGA Seniors Championship in 1979 by eight strokes over George Bayer.

When the Senior TPA TOUR officially started in June of 1980, Don won the opener. It was the Atlantic City Seniors, and he collected \$20,000 for his efforts. Later in the fall, he won the Australian Seniors, so his game knows no boundary or age limit.

Before he joined the Tour in 1956, Don played for the NCAA championship team at North Texas State University. In his first year, he won twice, the Dallas Open and the Apple Valley Clambake. His biggest victory was in the 1967 PGA Championship, as he edged Don Massengale in a playoff.

His most satisfying year, though, had to be 1976 when he won \$163,622 and was ninth on the list. He won the MONY Tournament of Champions, finished second twice and was third three times.

In 1972, Don left the Tour to devote his time to golf course construction in the Dallas area. When financing became difficult during the recession, he rejoined the Tour in 1975, soon after his 45th birthday. His remarkable comeback was highlighted in his home state when he defeated Larry Hinson in a playoff to win the San Antonio-Texas Open.

When Tom Jenkins was in his early teen years, his love was baseball. Golf never really entered his mind. One day, while pitching as a 14-year old, he tore a muscle in his right pitching arm and his days on the mound were over

"I have a brother who is about three years older," he said, "and he played golf. So, I started to go out with him. I played along for a couple of years, and when I was 16, I started to get involved.

He played junior tournaments around Houston, and it just so happened that Dave Williams, the Univesity of Houston golf coach, ran most of the junior events in that area.

It was natural, therefore, for Tom to move on to the University, and even today, he says, "Dave Williams is the man who was the most influential on my career.

John Mahaffey was the star of the team in 1970, the year the Cougars won the NCAA crown.

In the Fall of 1972, Jenkins headed for the TPA TOUR after going through the Qualifying School. "I even surprised myself in my first two full years and then I won the IVB-Philadelphia Clasic my third vear. in 1975.

At Philadelphia, he led by five shots after the second and third rounds, and finally won by one after Johnny Miller made a late charge.

He played well in 1976, too, and then a skid started. By 1978, he was all the way down to 186th on the money list and could lift himself up to only 171st by 1979 and 137th in 1980.

"I was married and moved from Houston to Florida," he said, "and my priorities changed. We had a daughter in 1979, and my family became the most important thing to me. I let my game suffer."

A friend of his named Dave Pelz from Baltimore planted the seed that made him think about getting competitive again. "He got me motivated, back to work and practicing late in 1980," he said. "In eight years on the Tour, I never practiced after the Tour ended in the fall. I'd just go home and relax."

With hard work and words of encouragement from Pelz, Tom started 1981 with a new outlook on the game. In his fourth start, the Wickes-Andy Williams San Diego Open, he was one off the lead after three rounds, and finished in a tie with Bruce Lietzke and Raymond Floyd at 10-under 278. Lietzke won it with a birdie on the second extra hole.

Nevertheless, Tom knew then that he could play again and he went on to enjoy his richest year, winning \$78,127

As long as the game is played, there may never be another year quite like the one Tom Kite enjoyed in 1981. It has been many years since anyone has seen one like it.

Consider these facts, if you would. He was the No. 1 money winner with \$375,699, ending Tom Watson's four-year reign at the top. He won the Vardon Trophy for the low stroke average, 69.80. He had more top 10 finishes than anyone, with 21. He stretched his no-cut streak to a Tour high of 35, going the distance in all 26 last year.

As the leading money winner, he was awarded the first Arnold Palmer Award. The Golf Writers of America also named him the Player of the Year.

He was eighth or better in his last 10 starts, and in 17 of his last 18. While his only victory came in the American Motors-Inverrary Classic, he was second three times and third three times. At Inverrary, he caught Jack Nicklaus and Curtis Strange on the final holes, when it appeared as if the other two would battle it out to the wire.

As many times as he tried to explain why he was so brilliantly consistent, he couldn't. Yet, all through his career, he has been known for his steadiness. In 1973 when he was named rookie of the year, he only missed the cut in three of 35 starts.

Kite's life in golf began at age 6, when his father put a club in his hand for the first time and urged him to take a swipe. At 11 he won his first tournament, an age-group event at the Country Club of Austin, Tex. He began to take the game seriously three years later.

Before his 21st birthday in 1970, Tom was medalist in the Western Amateur, runnerup to Lanny Wadkins in the U.S. Amateur, second in the Southern Amateur and was named to the four-man U.S. team in the World Amateur Team Championship.

The following year he was chosen on the U.S. Walker Cup team and, in 1972, he shared the NCAA title with his University of Texas teammate, Ben Crenshaw.

It was a very special year in 1981 for Bruce Lietzke. Not only did he blossom as one of the game's genuine superstars, he also left the ranks of the bachelors.

The handsome Lietzke won three times on the TPA TOUR and once off the Tour. In June, he married Rosemarie Nelson of Pensacola and on that day, he became Jerry Pate's brother-in-law as they now are married to sisters.

With his clubs, he was brilliant for most of the year with 13 top 10 finishes in 24 starts. His \$343,446 left him a close fourth in the money chase. He led in two statistical categories, Par Breakers and Eagle Leaders; was No. 2 in scoring average at 70.01; and third in hitting Greens in Regulation.

It has been said that he is capable of winning any tournament, anywhere, anytime. Two of his 1981 victories came in playoffs, as he outlasted Ray Floyd and Tom Jenkins in the Wickes-Andy Williams San Diego Open; and Tom Watson in the Byron Nelson Classic. He also won the Bob Hope Desert Classic.

It is hard to believe, but there was a time when Bruce put his golf clubs in the closet and wasn't certain if he wanted to continue with the game. It was in the Spring of 1973, shortly after he left the University of Houston,

"I had played so much through high school and college that I was tired of it," he said. At that time, he said he was through with the game. "Oh, I suppose, in the back of my mind, I knew I would get back to it.'

Six months later, he did, and he turned professional in 1974. He missed by one stroke in his first attempt at qualifying for the TPA TOUR, but he made it in the Spring of 1975.

He played well on Tour almost from the start, although his first victory did not come until the 1977 Joe Garagiola-Tucson Open when he defeated Gene Littler on the fourth extra hole. A couple of weeks later he won again in the Hawaiian Open.

Bruce started to play golf at age five when brother Duane, then an assistant professional in Wichita, Kan., gave him a cut-down set of clubs. While at Beaumont Forest Park High School in Texas, he won the Texas State Scholastic title as a sophomore and helped his team to one championship and three seconds in his four years. While at the University of Houston — where he roomed with Bill Rogers - he won the 1971 Texas State Amateur.

Shortly after Jack Renner came out on the TPA TOUR, he was asked if he had any idols, was there anyone he would like to emmulate.

Without hesitation, he said, "Gene Littler. I grew up in the San Diego area and Gene has lived there all of his life. I can assure you, there isn't one single person, anywhere, who can or would say one bad thing about Gene Littler. He is a great competitor and certainly one of the all-time greats in the game.

No one could have said it better. Gene has had his share of glory since starting on Tour in 1954, and he has known adversity, too. In the Spring of 1972, for example, he underwent surgery for cancer of the lymph glands. Most thought he never would reappear on Tour. Yet, he did, by the end of 1972. In July of 1973, about 16 months after surgery, he won the St. Louis Children's Hospital Classic.

In 1975, he won three times, and in 1977 he won again, giving him a grand total of 29 Tour triumphs through 1981. He now is focusing his main attention on the Seniors Tour and two years ago he won the World Seniors Invitational, and last year he won twice, the Legends of Golf with Bob Rosburg as his partner and in the Vintage Classic.

Gene won the 1953 United States Amateur and his first victory came in his hometown, the 1954 San Diego Open. He was an amateur at the time, the next week and turned professional and headed for the Thunderbird Classic in Palm Springs. As a result of the victory and then his triumph in the 1961 United States Open, he never has been subjected to qualifying for a Tour event.

In the San Diego event, he won by four over Dutch Harrison, and he once kidded, "I still have the trophy, but I'll bet Dutch doesn't have the money.'

Those who follow the game closely know that Mark Lye, a slender young man who honed his game on the fairways of Silverado Country Club in Napa, Calif., is not far from stardom.

Last year, he was one of the busiest players on the TPA TOUR, competing in 36 events, and even though his money winnings fell from the year before, he had his bright moments and once again found himself firmly established among the top 60 money winners.

As soon as Mark started to play the game, he knew he would be a golfer for the rest of his life. He received his first set of clubs as a nine-year-old, and he played every day, all day.

"I was small for my age," Mark recalls, "but I could beat the bigger guys in golf. I didn't start to grow until I was in college, so playing golf was the only way I could be competitive."

He played all over California, and in 1970, he was the No. 1 junior on the state's point system. As a 12-and-13-year old, he was winning tournaments.

He headed for San Jose State after being graduated from high school, and it was difficult at first, because he still had not started to sprout. As a freshman, he was five-feet-nine, 125 pounds. By the end of the next year, he was close to his present size of six-feet-two, 175 pounds.

After being graduated from San Jose State, he set his sights on the Tour, but first headed for Europe for more experience. He tried the Qualifying School in the Fall of 1975 and missed and again in the Spring of 1976 and missed. He was off to Europe, and then Australia after that, and blossomed as a winner. In fact, he won the 1976 Australian Order of Merit. In the Fall of 1976, he was back in the Qualifying School, and he made it.

After a decent first year, he had swing problems in 1978, but says it was Bobby Walzel and Bunky Henry who set him straight. He went on to win \$51,184 in 1979 and then became a front-liner in 1980 with \$109,454.

His best opportunity for his first Tour triumph came in the 1981 Phoenix Open. His second-round 65 gave him a one-stroke lead, but David Graham came on strong to win, while Mark finished fifth. He also tied for fifth in the Pleasant Valley Jimmy Fund Classic.

Although John Mahaffey claimed he was having problems with his driving, he did win again in 1981 as he captured the Anheuser-Busch Classic or the Kingsmill course in Virginia.

"With my type of game," he said, "I have to practice a lot. It's all due to timing." When it is right, it is deadly.

Although the victory at Kingsmill was the sixth or his Tour career, he probably would be far past that figure if he had been healthy every year. He has been the victim of some unfortunate accidents, although you never will hear him complain.

John joined the TPA TOUR in the Fall of 1971 after a fine amateur career. He won the 1970 NCAA championship for the University of Houston.

His first victory was in the 1973 Sahara Invitational in Las Vegas. Physical problems hit him for the first time at the 1976 PGA Championship at Congressional. He suffered a hyperextended tendon in his left elbow. It gradually became worse toward the end of the year, and it practically was impossible for him to compete early in 1977. He reached the point where he wondered if he would ever play the Tour again.

In the spring, he received the go-ahead to play, but before he had a chance, he fell off a ladder in his garage and broke a finger. He wasn't able to rejoin the Tour until July, and made checks in only five of 15 starts the rest of the year.

He was completely healthy again by mid-1978, and enjoyed a six-month stretch when he played as well as everyone knew he could. He won the PGA Championship at Oakmont in a playoff over Tom Watson and Jerry Pate, and the next week he won the American Optical Classic in Sutton, Mass.

He was named to the World Cup team that play∈d in Hawaii, and he won medalist honors. When the new year dawned, he won the Bob Hope Desert Classic.

Within a month, hard luck struck him again. Tryimg to blast out of a bunker at Pebble Beach in the Bing Crosby National Pro-Am, his clubhead tore into the heavy sod on the lip and came to a sudden halt. The result was that all of the tendons on the back of the hand and wrist gave away. He tried to play in Hawaii the next week but had to withdraw. It was three months before he could return.

If there was an award for hard work, Roger Maltbie would be one of the leading contenders.

The personable Californian was one of the brightest young stars in the game in 1976, but three years later, he was almost a forgotten man and he fell to 155th on the money list. With hard work and dedication, he pulled himself back into the front line in 1981, and came close to winning twice.

After shooting a third-round 64 in the Sammy Davis, Jr.-Greater Hartford Open, he led the field by two with a 197 total. "It's been a long time since I've been in this situation," he said softly. "I told my caddy coming down 17 that it was like running into an old friend."

He had a most respectable 68 the final afternoon, but Hubert Green had a 64 and edged him by one.

The next week in the Buick Open, he finished one stroke out of the four-way playoff, and he said, "For the first time in a long time, the game is at my fingertips."

Always a hard worker, he played one stretch of 15 straight weeks; rested during the World Series of Golf, and finished the year by playing in eight in a row. So, he played in 23 of the last 24 events on Tour.

Roger was as amazed as anyone by his startling performances midway through his rookie year of 1975. He won back-to-back tournaments, the Ed McMahon-Quad Cities Open and the Pleasant Valley Classic. After the latter, he left his winner's check of \$40,000 in a restaurant near the tournament site. The sponsor issued a new one, and, at last report, the original still hangs on the wall behind the bar.

The next year, he won the Memorial Tournament at Muirfield Village, defeating Hale Irwin on the fourth extra hole of their playoff.

Roger was a teammate of Forrest Fezler at James Lick High School in San Jose, Calif. As a sophomore, Roger beat Forrest, who was then a senior, for the county scholastic title. Maltbie went on to win the Northern California Amateur in 1972 and 1973, and the California State Open in 1974.

In his first attempt at qualifying for the Tour, he missed in the Fall of 1973, but the next year, he made it.

Last fall, Jerry McGee made one of the most important decisions of his life, and he is certain it also was one of the best.

He decided to accept the position as Director of Golf at Oak Tree Country Club, a mushrooming new development in western Pennsylvania near the town of West Middlesex. It is not too far across the border from his home in East Palestine, Ohio.

The opportunity, plus the health problems he has been experiencing since the end of 1979, means he will be playing a limited schedule in 1982. His career earnings of \$871,545 through last year qualify him for a year-long exemption.

Suffering from a severe case of hypoglycemia (deficiency of sugar in blood), he lacked a stamina for the rigorous Tour schedule. "I found I had trouble finishing rounds and tournaments," he said, although he did survive the cut in 14 of his 19 starts in 1981.

For many years, Jerry has been one of the more popular players on Tour. His quick wit and ready smile made him a delight to be around. Even in the most adverse conditions or situations, he usually could find something humorous.

He certainly has enjoyed his share of success, winning four times. His biggest year was in 1979 when he won the Kemper Open by a stroke over Jerry Pate; and the Sammy Davis, Jr.-Greater Hartford Open by one over Jack Renner.

No winner has ever been happier than McGee was in 1975 when he captured the Pensacola Open. It was his first triumph after nine years of trying. It prompted him to joke, "At least they won't be able to say sudden success spoiled me."

He enjoyed three years as a member of the Century Club, with 1979 his best at \$166,735. He also won the IVB-Philadelphia Classic in 1977, and that led him to achieving another of his goals, making the United States Ryder Cup team.

His progress up the ladder after making the grade in the 1966 Qualifying School was steady, although he did suffer a setback in 1971. In mid-summer, he pulled ligaments in his thumb and had to sit out the rest of the year. He was beginning to doubt if he ever would play on the Tour again.

Although the injury bothered him for the next year or so, his career skyrocketed in 1975 and he stayed on the high plane through 1979.

All through his career, when Johnny Miller has been on his game, he has been awesome. He has always been able to make the game appear so easy, driving down the middle, rifling his irons dead on the flagsticks and holing putts as if they were ho-hum experiences.

That was the case several times in 1981, and he came away with two impressive victories. The first was in the Joe Garagiola-Tucson Open when he overtook Dan Halldorson the last afternoon with a splendid 65. A few weeks later, he outlasted an old rival, Tom Weiskopf, down the stretch to win the Glen Campbell Los Angeles Open.

'I'm like a young player again,'' he said at one point. His earnings of \$193,167 were the highest since 1975

After he won the Bob Hope Desert Classic in 1976, he went four years without a Tour victory, and even he had a hard time explaining the reason. He did admit his priorities had changed and preferred spending more time with his growing family. Miller's arrival as a star always has been tied to his final-round 63 and victory in the 1973 U.S.

Open at Oakmont, but it was in 1974 that he won eight times and set what was then a record of \$353,021. He won the first three events of that year.

The next year, Johnny's clubs were blazing again. He won the Phoenix Open to start the year with a 24-under par score, and the next week won the Tucson Open with a 25-under score. In each tournament, he had a round of 61

No one has touched back-to-back efforts like that since.

In 1966, Johnny first gained national notoriety when he signed up to caddy in the U.S. Open at the Olympic Club in his native San Francisco. However, he eventually qualified to play in the tournament, and went on to an eighth-place finish.

He started in the game at age five, and one of his first titles was the U.S. Juniors in 1964. He went to Brigham Young University and was graduated in 1969. Later that year, he qualified for the Tour.

When Orville Moody arrived at the Houston Champions Golf Club for the 1969 United States Open, there was only one person, other than Orville himself, who thought he had a chance.

His pal, Lee Trevino, told him, "If I don't win it this week, I think you will, Sarge."

Those words meant a lot to Orville, and he did go on to win the Open in one of the Championship's biggest surprises. He was only two years out of the Army and only a year away from giving up the Tour completely.

There have not been many other highlights to Orville's TPA TOUR career, but later in that year, he joined with Trevino and they won the World Cup title for the United States. He also won such things as the 1958 All-Army Championship and the 1962 All-Service Championship, definitely highlights in his mind

Orville's father was a golf course superintendent in Oklahoma and he says, "I've been playing the game for as long as I can remember." He won the Oklahoma State high school crown.

He was offered an athletic scholarship to the University of Oklahoma, but left college shortly after enrolling and enlisted in the Army. After a stint as a rifle instructor, his golfing talents were recognized, and was placed in charge of maintenance, instruction and supervision of Army courses. He served in Japan, Korea, Germany and the United States. He even won three Korean Opens.

In 1967, while stationed at Fort Hood in Killeen, TX., he decided to give up his 14-year career in the Army - he was a Staff Sergeant - and try the Tour. He gave himself two years to make good, or he would return to the Army.

He made it through the 1967 Qualifying School, but it was not an easy year in 1968, winning \$12,950. A few times, he was on the verge of quitting, but decided to stick by his original plan to give the Tour at least two years.

Orville, who is part Cherokee Indian, only plays a limited schedule now. In 1981, he entered seven events and cashed checks in two, the Byron Nelson and LaJet Classics. His victory in the Open Championship gave him unlimited exempt status.

Gil Morgan is a very personable, quiet sort of fellow who can slip by unnoticed, but when he is on the golf course, his colleagues know where he is.

He is one of the game's more consistent players with an impeccable swing. It keeps his name on the leaderboard week after week, and last year profited him by \$171,184.

His biggest victory was in the 1978 World Series of Golf when he defeated Hubert Green in a playoff and finished the year as the No. 2 money winner behind Tom Watson. With his powerful, fluid swing action, he always has been able to play the more difficult courses well.

Gil started to play the game at age 15. When he was a junior at East Central State in Oklahoma, he decided to pursue it as a career, along with his goal of some day obtaining a degree in optometry. He won the Oklahoma collegiate championship in 1967, but waited until he earned his doctorate in optometry before turning professional in 1972.

His best national amateur performances came in the Western Amateur and Porter Cup, finishing second in 1972. He entered the Qualifying School in the Fall of 1972, but did not make it. After a stint on the mini-tours, he returned in 1973 and passed his test.

Although he did not gain a lot of national amateur attention, Darmy Edwards said that the players around Oklahoma knew all about him. "Oh, yeah, we knew all about the fellow named Morgan who lived in Wewoka."

He progressed steadily up the ladder on the Tour until he won the 1977 B.C. Open by five strokes over Lee Elder. The next year, he won the Glen Campbell-Los Angeles Open and then the World Series of Golf. He pocketed \$267,459 for the year and was the No. 2 money winner behind Tom Watson.

Although he did not play well early in 1979, he did pull his game together in the Danny Thomas-Memphis Classic and won in a playoff over his close friend, Larry Nelson. He had to hole a long putt from the fringe on the second extra hole.

Three times in 1981 he finished second, once losing in a playoff to Hale Irwin in the Buick Open. In the Heritage Classic and LaJet Classic, he tied for second, only one stroke behind the respective winners.

It was another good year in 1981 for the jovial Bob Murphy, and even though victory eluded him once again, he made a significant contribution to his bank account.

Only once during his fine 14-year career on the TPA TOUR, has he missed making the list of top 60 money winners, and that is a true testament to his consistency.

Playoffs must not be his cup of tea, as last year he lost his fifth in six tries. At the Tallahassee Open, he was tied with Dave Eichelberger and rookie Mark O'Neara, but Eichelberger won on the first extra hole.

Late in the year, he fired a splendid six-under par 64 at the field the last afternoon, and tied for third in the Texas Open.

Bob's career started in a rather unusual fashion. He went to the University of Florida on a baseball scholarship as a pitcher, but he injured a shculder in a pick-up football game as a freshman.

He took up golf as a physical education course and it was love at first sight. He said he would even skip class to practice.

Before he was graduated with a degree in physical education, he won the 1965 United States Amateur championship, the 1966 NCAA title for the Gators, two Florida Amateur titles, the 1967 Florida Open, and played on U.S. World Amateur Cup and Walker Cup teams.

He turned professional and went to the TPA TOUR School in 1967, and passed easily. In his rookie year of 1968, he set a goal of winning \$40,000. He won \$105,595, a record for a first-year player at that time, and two tournaments, the Philadelphia and Thunderbird Classics, back-to-back. Just prior to his first victory, he was second in the Westchester Classic.

He has won twice since then, the 1970 Greate Hartford Open and the 1975 Jackie Gleason-Inverrary Classic.

He had off years in 1976 and 1977, due mainly to a uric acid condition that gave him hand problems, came back slightly in 1978 and then, for the only time in his Tour career, slipped from the list of top 60 money winners in 1979. He was 62nd, only \$770 behind the 60th man. He figured he needed one more putt, somewhere, to keep his streak alive.

With each passing year, the people in the sports world are becoming more impressed with a soft-spoken Georgian named Larry Nelson. The bigger the challenge, the better he seems to respond. He has had three straight brilliant years, and two of them, 1979 and 1981, were the type from

which heroes emerge.

In 1979, he won two tournaments and then was the leading performer in the Ryder Cup matches, being involved in five winning points against Great Britain-Ireland-Europe.

This past year, he won the Greater Greensboro Open after an unbelievable finish; swept all honors easily in the PGA Championship; and then piled up four more winning points for Uncle Sam in Ryder Cup play.

At Greensboro, he trailed his pal, Mark Hayes, by two as they approached the 18th green. Mark was on the back edge, while Larry had a near-impossible bunker shot. Larry later admitted he wasn't sure he even could get the ball on the green. He did better than that. He holed it for a birdie. Mark took three to get down, and then in the playoff, Larry won it on the second extra hole.

In the PGA before thousands of his hometown friends at the Atlanta Athletic Club, he was masterful. After rounds of 66-66 the second and third days, he led by four, and finally won by that margin over Fuzzy Zoeller.

Larry started on Tour in 1974, but his first victory didn't come until six years later in the Jackie Gleason-Inverrary Classic. Later that same year, he defeated Ben Crenshaw for the Western Open title.

There are not many stories on the TPA TOUR more unusual than Nelson's. Only four years after he started to play golf, and after playing only one 72-hole tournament, he had his Approved Tournament Players card. "I really wasn't ready," he said later, but he got ready in a hurry, as witness his steady climb up the money rankings since then.

Larry lettered in baseball and basketball in high school and attended Southern Tech for a year before he was drafted and spent two years in the military. After his discharge in 1968, he tried school again and also worked as an illustrator at the Lockheed plant near his home.

He went to a driving range one day in 1969, liked hitting balls so much that he went to work in pro Bert Seagraves' shop at the Pine Tree Club in Kennesaw, Ga. He turned pro six months after that. He tried the mini-tours briefly and, in 1973, finished bogey-bogey in the Florida State Open to lose by a shot. That was his lone 72-hole event before earning his Tour card that fall.

Bobby Nichols has had one of the leading names in golf for nearly two decades, yet, he came very close to not being able to play at all.

Since he started on the TPA TOUR in 1960, Bobby has won 12 times, including the 1964 PGA Championship at the Columbus (OH) Country Club. It was there that he seemingly made great shots from all corners of the golf course and holed putts frcm one end of the state to the other. He won by three over Jack Nicklaus and Arnold Palmer.

Several years earlier, Bobby was an outstanding football and basketball player at St. Xavier High School in Louisville, Ky. On September 3, 1952, he was critically injured when a car in which he was a passenger failed to make a curve and crashed.

He suffered a broken pelvis, back injuries, a brain concussion and internal injuries. He was paralyzed from the waist down and was unconscious for 13 days. He was hospitalized for 96 days.

His football and basketball days were over, but he still could play golf, when he finally regained the use of his legs. While going on to win junior golf titles in Kentucky, he met Bear Bryant, then the football coach at the University of Kentucky. Bryant went on to Texas A&M, and proceeded to give Bobby a scholarship to play golf for the Aggies.

Bobby won the 1956 Southwestern Conference title, and after he was graduated, spent two years in the Army. He held the rank of Captain in the reserves.

He came out on Tour in 1960, and two years later was honored by the Golf Writers Association of America with the Ben Hogan Award for his courageous comeback.

He had another terrifying moment at the 1975 Western Open. That was when he felt the effects of a bolt of lightning and was taken to the hospital with Lee Trevino and Jerry Heard. He has not played with the same effectiveness since.

Since then, there have been many classic performances, especially in the world's more significant events.

He has won five Masters Tournaments and five PGA Championships; four U.S. Opens; three Tournament Players Championships and British Opens; one World Series of Golf; and two U.S. Amateur Championships.

On the TPA TOUR, he has won 68 times, but few realize he has been second 48 times, including in three events last year; and third on 31 occasions. His stroke average through 20 years of play is slightly over 70.4. Eight times he has been the leading money winner and four other years, finished second. It is an amazing record for an amazing man.

After his victory in the United States Open at Denver's Cherry Hills Country Club in 1978, Andy North saw his game starting to deteriorate, and he acmitted part of the reason was a lack of motivation.

He was beginning to wonder what it was like to be in contention again, and he found out in two splendid weeks last summer. He birdled five of the last seven holes in the Anheuser-Busch Classic to finish second to John Mahaffey. The next week, he played well again, and tied for second, just one stroke in back of Peter Oosterhuis in the Canadian Open.

"I'm pleased to be playing well again," the big tellow said. "I've been playing better lately, but the last two weeks, the putts have been dropping."

Near the end of 1980, he started to work harde on his game, and the results became evident last summer. "For me, a lot of it is timing, and I have to work to keep it right," he said.

Andy's victory in the Open at Cherry Hills showed how much inner-strength this big fellow has. He led by two after 36 holes and by one after 54. He increased his lead to four strokes with five to play, but he saw that evaporate quickly and faced the last hole needing a bogey to win. That's just what he scored, too, after being bunkered in three, blasting to four feet and holing the putt for the victory.

An unusual ailment helped lead North to golf when he was in the seventh grade in Madison, Wis. A bone in his knee had stopped growing and was disintegrating. While on crutches for 18 months he was told to give up his pursuit of basketball and football but that he could play golf — if he rode in a cart.

Since Andy's father was a low-handicap golfer, the game was no stranger to the family and he progressed quickly. He also returned to basketball and was chosen all-state as a high school senior, but by then golf was his dominant sport.

North won the Wisconsin high school championship in 1966 and 1967, the State Amateur in 1969 and placed second in the Wisconsin Open in 1968 and 1969. After entering the University of Florida he was chosen All-American for three years and won the 1971 Western Amateur.

Mark O'Meara has set goals all through his golfing career, and, thus far, the handsome Californian has been able to meet them.

He started to play the game at age 13 after his family moved to Mission Viejo. A golf course was directly below their home and, at the time, Mark didn't know many of the kids in the neighborhood. So, he would slip onto the course and play.

"My Dad played," he said, "but that wasn't the main reason I started. Once I did, I liked it, and then I started to set the goals."

He wanted to make the golf team as a freshman at Mission Viejo High School, and he did. His junior year, the team won the state championship.

He wanted to play well enough to earn a college scholarship, and he did that, too, going to Long Beach State University. His next goal was to be classified as an All-American, and he made the third team as a freshman and second team as a senior.

He broke onto the national scene in a big way in 1979, winning the United States Amateur at Canterbury in Cleveland, defeating John Cook in the finals. He won the California State Amateur, defeating Lennie Clements in the final and also won the Mexican Amateur, defeating Gary Hallberg the last day.

"That convinced me I could play," he said. Because of his U.S. title, he was able to play in the Masters Tournament, two World Series of Golf, the Byron Nelson Classic and the Colonial National Invitation.

"That was a big help," he said, "because when I came on Tour for the start of last year, I wasn't in total awe of the players. I certainly had respect for their games, but I had played with them and seen them before."

He classifies his first year of 1981 as a success, "but I didn't play as well as I wanted or expected." He reached two other goals as he finished among the top 60 money winners and was named Rookie-of-the-Year.

At Tallahassee, he had two 65s, a 67 and a second round 74 as he tied Dave Eichelberger and Bob Murphy, with Eichelberger winning the playoff. He finished fourth alone in the Bay Hill Classic and had two other top 10 finishes.

He prefers to play with a draw off the tee, and with a slight fade with the irons.

When Jack Nicklaus completed his final round in the 1981 Canadian Open Championship, he walked toward the scorer's tent, approached Peter Oosterhuis and congratulated him on his victory.

"I'm happy for you, Peter," he said. "You've been very patient waiting for this first win."

Oosterhuis's smile grew even wider, and he replied, "Thanks, Jack, but rather than being patient, I think I was just stubborn."

Oosterhuis was a big winner on the European circuit when he left the shores of his native England to seek his fame on the TPA TOUR in the Fall of 1974.

He did not win again until he mastered the diff culties of the Glen Abbey course in Oakville, Ontario, winning with a four-under par score of 280 Just one stroke back were Nicklaus, Bruce Lietzke and Andy North.

The \$76,500 first prize represented more than the had ever won in an entire season. His best previous year was 1977 when he won \$60,083.

A fine amateur, Peter was a member of Britain's Walker Cup team in 1967 and won the 1968 Eisenhower Trophy. In the early 1970's, he was the leading player on the European circuit. Starting in 1971, he led the British Order of Merit for four straight years. That is the same as being the number one money winner on the TPA TOUR.

He won 19 times, including such titles as the 1∋73 and 1974 French Opens and 1974 Italian Open. In fact, the latter was his last victory prior to the Canacian.

Oosterhuis was the third-round leader in the 1573 Masters Tournament and finished alone in third place. In the 1974 Monsanto Open at Pensacola, he was the leader coming down the stretch, but Lee Elder birdied three of the last four holes to tie him, and then Lee won the playoff.

Early in 1981, Peter admits his game was going nowhere. While at the Heritage Classic, his longtime friend, Bert Yancey, told him he needed a better routine over the ball.

"I was never set in my own mind what I wanted o do with each shot, even when I was over the ball," Peter confessed. "Bert stressed the importance of knowing what I wanted to do before addressing it, develop a routine and stay with it."

Gradually, his game started to come together again. All he lacked was the consistency to put four solid rounds together. He did that at Glen $Abbe_{Y}$.

Peter was born in London. His father was from Holland, and he went to England during World War II, where he met his bride-to-be.

Arnold Palmer has been honored by many people from many nations during his distinguished career as an athlete and businessman, but one of his most cherished moments came late in 1980 when it was announced by Commissioner Deane R. Beman that, starting in 1981, the leading money winner on the TPA TOUR would receive the Arnold Palmer Award.

Tom Kite was the first recipient.

Since Arnold was the Tour's leading money winner for many years, the first player to reach the \$1 million mark in winnings, and, generally, done so much to popularize the game, Commissioner Beman said it would be appropriate to give the 1980 inaugural award to Arnold himself.

Palmer won the U.S. Amateur championship in 1954 and joined the Tour the next year. He won 61 Tour events, and now that he has moved into Seniors' play, his success continues. He won the PGA Seniors in 1980, and last summer, outlasted Billy Casper and Bob Stone to win the USGA Seniors title.

Arnold still enjoys the competition as much as anyone and last year made a dozen appearances on the regular Tour. He admits, with a smile, "I haven't stopped thinking that I still can win." His legions feel the same way.

Jerry Pate has always had the feel for a good story, but late one Sunday afternoon in June of 1981, he came up with a dandy. After clinching his victory in the Danny Thomas-Memphis Classic, he casually handed his visor and glove to his caddy, strolled toward the lake to the left of the green, and dove in. From there, he proceeded to swim to the other side.

The triumph ended 30 winless months for Pate, and, earlier in the week, he told a few friends that if he won, he would make the big splash.

Pate, who can be positively brilliant when at the top of his game, enjoyed his most productive year since starting on Tour in 1976. He won again before the year was over, capturing his hometown Pensacola Open. He had three runner-up finishes; made the cut in all 24 of his starts, and banked a career high of \$280,627.

Even though he has seven victories and earnings of over \$1 million, he said, "I'm only 28 years old, and I'd like to think I'm just coming into my best years."

Pate literally burst into world-wide attention as a TPA TOUR rookie in 1976. His last swing in the U.S. Open, a five-iron from the rough at Atlanta Athletic Club, left him a two-foot birdie putt for a twoshot victory, and his closing 63 in the Canadian Open was good for a four-stroke victory over Jack Nicklaus. His total of \$153,102 in official earnings is the most ever won by a rookie.

Conrad Rehling, who developed Bob Murphy while coaching at the University of Florida in the early 1960s, found another champion-to-be about a decade later while coaching at a small college near Pensacola. Pate was still in high school when he came under Rehling's wing. When Rehling moved to the University of Alabama, Pate followed. In 1974, like Murphy nine years earlier, Pate won the U.S. and Florida Amateur titles.

Jerry also helped Uncle Sam win the 1974 World Amateur Team championship, the 1975 Walker Cup matches and the 1981 Ryder Cup matches.

All you have to do is look at the TPA TOUR Statistics to find out how well Calvin Peete can play this game. In 1980, he finished second in Driving Accuracy and third in hitting Greens in Regulation. Last year, he was the big No. 1 in both categories and by a wide margin.

The key, he says, "is being able to maintain my balance through the ball and not overswinging."

He has had what amounts to two different careers on Tour. During his first three full years, he won a total of \$63,950. During the last three he has won \$321,440, with one victory, in the 1979 Greater Milwaukee Open.

Calvin was 23 years old when he first picked up a golf club back in 1966. The game was of no interest to him because he had to struggle to make a living for himself and his family.

Born in Detroit, Mich., Calvin spent most of his life on a Florida farm with his 18 brothers and sisters — through two marriages by his father. He was forced to drop out of school at an early age.

"Like so many black families," Peete said, "most of us kids had to get jobs as soon as we were old enough to work so we could help out with the expenses."

While still a teenager, Peete got into the business of selling goods to migrant farm workers. The field hands had little chance of getting into the city stores, so Peete would pack clothes, rings, watches, jewelry and anything else he could squeeze into his station wagon and take off. Wherever the migrant workers went, Peete was not far behind. From Florida it was a series of selling stops along dusty roads as far north as Rochester, N.Y.

Peete had friends in Rochester, and would end his Summer's trek with them. Each year his New York buddies would invite him to play golf.

"I always turned them down," Peete said. "I thought the game was silly. Who wants to chase a little ball around under the hot sun? How could that be fun?"

Finally, in 1966, Calvin tried the game with his friends and he was hooked. He recalls: "Just about that same time I saw a tournament on television and learned that Jack Nicklaus was making around \$200,000 a year chasing that ball. I figured I could be happy with one-third that amount, so I decided to give it a try." Without the help of a teaching pro, Calvin began practicing and playing virtually all the time.

Always a natural athlete, Peete improved rapidly and he began to play in amateur tournaments wherever he could. Eventually he entered the TPA TOUR's Qualifying School. Like so many others, Peete failed on his first try. And the second. But he made it the third time, in the Spring of 1975.

The question has often been asked of Gary Player, "What sort of record on the United States TPA TOUR could he have established if he had played here fulltime for the last 25 years."

The figures probably would have been staggering. Stopping off between flights to other tournaments around the world, he managed to win 21 times and collect well over \$1.6 million in earnings. On other parts of the globe, he has won more than 100 times, including the Open championship of his South Africa homeland 11 times.

His love for his native land and his family, though, made it far more important for him to keep his roots there rather than move elsewhere in search of additional fame and glory. He was one of the original inductees into the World Golf Hall of Fame at Pinehurst.

Without question, one of the great players of all time, Player, in 1978, became the 11th man in Tour history to win three in a row when he came from seven back with a last-day 64 to win the Masters. He was seven back starting the last day at the Tournament of Champions, and won. The next week in Houston, he trailed by three and still managed to grab the brass ring.

It is interesting to note that his best finish in the U.S. in 1981 was a tie for 15th in one of his favorite tournaments, the Masters. He has won it three times.

Dan Pohl has established himself as unquestionably the longest hitter on the TPA TOUR. In 1980, the first year such statistics were logged, Pohl was the leader with an average of 274.3 yards. Last year, he increased it to 280.1, with his longest belt being 359 yards at the LaJet Classic in Abilene, Texas.

"I know it would be even better than that," he says, "if I could use the driver off every tee on the measured holes. Sometimes, I have to back off to the three wood or one iron."

His zest for power made him an outstanding baseball hitter for Mt. Pleasant High in Michigan, although he was a pitcher. When he first started to play golf, he continued to swing viciously, but soon realized it also was important to keep the ball on the course, somewhere.

It's always been natural for me to swing hard," he said, "but I had to learn to swing hard and with control."

Although he started in the game at age five, baseball and basketball were his first loves. He was so competitive, though, that he wanted to play everything. He played four years of high school golf, and had improved enough by his senior year that "Steve Robbins, my high school coach, wrote to several colleges. Arizona responded, so that was where I went."

Even today, he credits Robbins and Arizona coach John Gibson with helping him the most.

He earned his Tour card on his second attempt, in June of 1978, but the following 12 months profited him only \$1,047. He went back to the school in June of 1979 and regained his playing privileges.

With new vigor, he attempted to qualify for the Canadian Open and Danny Thomas-Memphis Classic, but could gain only alternate status. He didn't get in either one.

The next week, he qualified for the Western Open, and suddenly, he was in the spotlight. With three holes to play on Sunday afternoon at the Butler National Golf Club, Dan Pohl was in the lead.

"I had played solid all day," he said, "but you can't believe how pumped up I was. I thought I was putting good swings on it, but the ball started to act like it was shot out of a cannon. I hit every approach shot over the greens on the last three, and bogeyed each one of them."

He tied for third, only one stroke out of the Larry Nelson-Ben Crenshaw playoff, won by Nelson. Nevertheless, he won \$17,400, and he was here to stay.

His best finish in 1981 was a third in the PGA Championship behind Larry Nelson and Fuzzy Zoeller. He had seven top 10 finishes as compared to five the year before, and lowered his stroke average slightly to 71.59.

The Don Pooley story is an interesting one. It shows what a person can do who is willing to work at his profession and, as he says, also have a strong faith in the Lord.

After suffering through a miserable year in 1979, winning only \$6,932 due mainly to muscle spasms in his back and tendinitis in his left hand, he rebounded with a \$157,973 year in 1980. The improvement of \$151,041 was the biggest jump on Tour that year.

He wasn't quite as successful financially in 1981, but a surge in August when he had three top 10 finishes, assured him of a place among the top 60 money winners again.

Looking back to 1979, the first step to success came in November and December. Feeling better physically, he entered mini-tour events in Phoenix and won two of them. He played well enough in the others to collect \$12,000.

His wife Margaret was to have a baby early in January, so he skipped the first month of the 1980 Tour. He tried to qualify for the Bing Crosby, and did not make it. He tried again the next week for the Hawaiian Open, and was second alternate. On Tuesday night, while at home in Tucson, he received a call from the Island, that he was in. Without a practice round, Don tied for 14th, won \$6,063 and was on his way to the banner year.

"I made some changes in my set-up to a more open stance," he said, "and in my putting, to be more erect, but winning \$100,000 never entered my mind back then." He tied for 24th in the Joe Garagiola-Tucson Open the week after Hawaii, and was fourth alone in the Glen Campbell-Los Angeles Open. In three weeks, he won more than \$20,000.

The victory he wanted came at the B.C. Open in late August. He was tied with Lee Trevino at 10-under par 203 after three, and his closing 68 gave him a one-stroke margin over Peter Jacobsen, and Trevino slipped into a tie for third.

Don says he has been playing golf for as long as he can remember. He received his first set of clubs on his seventh birthday. His father was — and still is — an avid golfer and they play in father-son events at Victoria Country Club in Riverside, Calif.

He improved at each level of competition, and was the No. 1 man on his Riverside High School team and then played No. 1 on the University of Arizona team.

He played the mini-tours for a while after college, and it wasn't until his third attempt at the Qualifying School in the Fall of 1975, that he obtained his card. He won only \$2,139 that first year, and promptly lost his privileges. Undaunted, he went back into the School in the Fall of 1976, regained it and has been on Tour ever since.

It was quite a graduating class at the Qualifying School in the Fall of 1971, with Tom Watson, David Graham, John Mahaffey, Lanny Wadkins, Leonard Thompson and Greg Powers, among others.

While some had nearly instant success, others have had to wait a decade to break through, and Powers is one who has played with as much determination as any of them.

Greg has battled either to be on the Tour or stay on during the last 11 years, and in 1981, he reaped some of the harvest with \$82,210 and 52d place on the money list.

Now, for the first time, this extremely personable fellow will be exempt for the year and, as they say, "it couldn't happen to a nicer guy."

Greg's first attempt at obtaining a Tour card came in the Fall of 1970, but he didn't make it. He went overseas to play for most of 1971. When he returned, he passed with flying colors in the Fall of 1971.

As luck would have it, he broke a small bone in his hand in the Spring, as he recalls, "playing the 15th hole at the Kemper Open in Charlotte, NC," and the hand was in a cast for eight weeks.

He accepted a position as head pro at the Richland Country Club in Nashville, and stayed there three years. His heart still was on the Tour, though.

He won the 1975 Tennessee PGA Sectional championship, and that let him play the Tour in 1976. He didn't win enough to stay, so he went back to Nashville. Near the end of the year, he won the PGA Sectional championship again, and when he came back out on Tour for the start of 1978, he was back to stay.

His fondest memory of 1981 was in the Western Open. He led after the second round, but a 75 on the third day dropped him three in back of Bill Rogers. Finally, with a two-under par 70 on Sunday, he tied for second, but his \$22,400 check set up his entire year.

Two weeks later, he opened with a horrendous 78 in the Anheuser-Busch Classic, but played brilliantly the rest of the way with 67-69-67 to tie for third and collect another \$15,600.

"I'm still maturing as a player," he said with one of his patented bright smiles, "and I'm proving that persistence can pay off."

Greg started in golf at age 12 in Charlotte, NC., under the tutelage of his father and enjoyed reasonable success in junior events. The family moved to Stamford, CT., when he was in the ninth grade, and he played football and basketball along with golf through high school. As a junior in 1964, he won the Connecticut scholastic golf title.

He received a scholarship to Memphis State University and "I pursued golf to the utmost. I knew then I wanted to play the Tour." As a collegian, he played in three Memphis Classics, and twice made the 36-hole cut.

Everyone agrees that Tom Purtzer is a solid player, one who generally plays the more difficult courses well. He can drive it for great distances and his smooth, powerful swing keeps the irons on line most of the time, too.

The only question is why hasn't he won more o'ten? Even Tom finds it puzzling, although his overall record for the last three years is one of the better ones on the TPA TOUR.

His lone victory was in the 1977 Glen Campbell Los Angeles Open on the challenging Riviera Country Club course. Consistency was a problem early in his career, but he has improved steadily in that area. Last year, he only missed the cut six times in 30 starts.

Three times in 1981 Tom tied for third, and in each case it was on a strong course at the Memorial Tournament, Byron Nelson Classic and the Anheuser-Busch Classic. He lowered his scoring average to 71.22 and his average driving distance of 275.6 was third best on Tour. In 1980, he was eighth in that classification, with a 269.4 average.

Tom Purtzer got an early start in golf because his father, Horace, enjoyed the game.

"Dad was a good golfer," Purtzer said, in recalling his own background in the game. "I guess he was a two or a three handicapper when I was very young. He wanted both of his sons to play the game and Paul and I were given cut-down clubs. We started hitting the ball, I guess, when we were eight or nine.

"Meanwhile, I liked baseball and football and played both. When I got to high school I gave up baseball. I played high school football and then concentrated on golf."

Purtzer continued to play golf for Arizona State and became one of the better collegiate players. He also won both the Arizona State amateur title and the Southwest Open in 1972.

The next year, 1973, Tom won the Broadmoor Men's Invitational and also was named to the All-America Collegiate golf team. He turned pro not long after being graduated with a business degree. Tom failed to earn his playing privileges at the TPA TOUR's Qualifying School twice. He recalls:

"The first time was only by two shots but the second was by a bunch."

Tom continued to season his game by competing on mini-tours in Arizona and Southern California and also went abroad in 1975.

Mike Reid was his usual consistent self early in 1981 as he tied for third in the Phoenix Open and the next week tied for sixth in the Bing Crosby National Pro-Am, just one stroke out of the five-way playoff.

Then he headed for home for one of the most important days of his life. On the day after the Crosby, his wife, Randolyn, presented him with their first born, a daughter.

Mike stayed home for the next two weeks, and when he did return, his mind was on his young family in Provo, Utah. The quiet fellow who missed only one cut in all of 1980, missed it in six of his next eight starts. Finally, in May, with his family at his side, the Mike Reid of 1980 surfaced again, and he went on to enjoy a \$93,037 year.

He was No. 2 to Calvin Peete in Driving Accuracy and that always has been his forte. In 1980, he finished third four times, compiled 13 top 10 finishes in 28 starts and was in the top 10 in five statistical categories.

His secret is accuracy and consistency. He believes he can play well on any type of course, and he tries to model his game after the likes of Billy Casper, Gene Littler and Lou Graham. "Week after week," he said, "when they were playing well, they always finished up high."

Mike's father was a Colonel in the Air Force when he retired, but during his growing-up days, Mike was in many different cities. At an early age, he realized golf was a game he could play alone, and it was a game that gave him something in common with others no matter where they lived.

His older brother, Bill, is head professional at Sahalee Country Club in Seattle, and has been Mike's biggest teacher. He also credits the John Geerstens, Senior and Junior, at Monterey Peninsula Country Club with assisting him.

Mike went to Brigham Young University, and was a teammate of Mike Brannan, Jim Nelford, John Fought and Pat McGowan. The first time he attempted to get his Tour card, he made it, in the Fall of 1976. He progressed up the ladder the next three years, and his closest bout with victory was in the 1978 Pensacola Open. He lost in a playoff to Mac McLendon.

In December of 1979, he took a major step. He was married, and ever since, he has said that Randolyn has played an important role in his success. "I'm more at peace with myself," he says, "and not fighting the game as much as I once did. Besides, it is nice to have someone out there pulling for you besides your caddy."

Jack Renner has enjoyed success all through his golf career, and one of the reasons is because he always has set lofty goals, and then worked tirelessly to meet them.

Last year, he was having what he considered his most consistent year on Tour as he headed for the Pleasant Valley-Jimmy Fund Classic. "I told my Dad that unless I won, though, people would think I was having a mediocre year."

A few days later, he had his victory, the second of his five-year career as he edged Scott Simpson by two strokes. "Now, I know I've had my best year," he said happily.

Renner is a tireless worker and intense competi or. It isn't any wonder that he has tried to pattern his approach to the game after Hale Irwin's.

He started on Tour as a 20-year old and his first victory came in the 1977 Manufacturers Hanover-Westchester Classic. His performances slipped slightly in 1980 after suffering mononucleosis early in the year. It was several months before he regained his full strength.

Jack is easily identified. Rail thin, he always wears a white cap, similar to the type Ben Hogan wore for years. However, Jack says he has always worn that style because it is lightweight, comfortable, and during his years of growing up around Palm Springs, "I needed something to protect my head from the sun."

As a youngster, he was the king of the junior tournaments in the San Diego area. He won such titles as the 1972 World Junior and the 1973 United Stattes Junior. His short game always has been excellent, and he believes he refined it by playing so many par three courses as a youth.

During his school days, he chose not to play varsity golf because he felt he could progress more rapidly by working on his own game, rather than spending the time travelling to matches.

The Renners are an avid golf family. Sister Jane has been a part of the LPGA Tour for five years and younger brother Jim has been a professional for two years. When one of them needs help, they seek out a member of the family.

Even in his fondest dreams, it would have been difficult for Bill Rogers to picture himself having a year such as 1981 and being named PGA Player-of-the-Year.

Winner of the World Series of Golf, the Heritage Classic and the Texas Open on Tour, plus the British Open, Japan's Suntory Open and New South Wales Open is Australia; Rogers was dazzling once he got his act together starting with the Tournament Players Championship.

The year had a strange beginning. He was seventh in the Joe Garagiola-Tucson Open and fourth in the Bob Hope Desert Classic. Then his game nearly fell apart. He missed cuts in five of his next six starts. He only tied for 51st in the TPC, but it was there, at Sawgrass, that he could see his game taking shape again. Indeed it did, because he won the Heritage Classic the next week.

Always an aggressive player, he never could figure out why he didn't win more. Through his first six years, his only triumph was in the 1978 Bob Hope Desert Classic.

In 1979, Bill won \$230,500 and that stands as a record for the most money won without the benefit of a victory. "If I couldn't have won a tournament, I suppose that is a nice record to have," he said, smiling.

"The more times you get close to the top, the easier you can handle it," he added. "The mental aspect of the game and your swing work better together under pressure situations." In the last three years, he has had a total of 30 top 10 finishes.

Bill started to play the game at age nine in Montgomery, Ala., and was playing competitively by the time he was 13 and the family was living in Texarkana, Texas. Although his father and brother started him, it was Jerry Robinson, professional at Northridge Country Club in Texarkana, who taught him the fine points of the game.

While attending the University of Houston, he was a roommate of Bruce Lietzke and the latter nicknamed him the "Panther." As Bill recalls, "I was the jumpy type. I never wanted to miss anything and I still don't, but I have slowed down some."

Bill's father was a lieutenant colonel in the Air Force and from age three to six, he lived in Germany; from age six through eight, he lived in Morocco, North Africa. "Dad retired as a colonel and he still is a good player. He played in a lot of major Air Force tournaments when he was in the service."

It was an interesting year for Jim Simons in 1981 as he passed the \$100,000 mark in winnings for the first time in his nine-year career; he was elected a Player Director on the TPA TOUR'S Policy Board, and he became an Investment Executive with Shearson-Loeb-Rhoades, Inc.

There was a marked improvement in his consistency, as he missed the cut only five times in 30 starts — and only once in his last 16 tournaments. He also cut his scoring average by better than halfa-stroke.

His two best finishes were on two of the more difficult courses, as he tied for second in the Western Open and tied for fourth in the Tournament Players Championship.

Jim's initial victory was in the 1977 First NBC-New Orleans Open and then he won the 1978 Memorial Tournament in a rather suspenseful style. Five times in the last seven holes, he saved par with one-putts; and, at the final hole, he made a 21-footer for par to win by one.

Jim Simons will be the first to say that his early years on the TPA TOUR were not up to expectations. He probably won't mention, however, that he was hampered with physical ailments. He had tendonitis in his left wrist, but more painful was his left shoulder which was diagnosed as a "looseness in the joint — a minor dislocation." It was the result of some "horsing-around" in his fraternity house at Wake Forest.

Simons was graduated from the Fall 1972 TPA TOUR Qualifying School and did not have an opportunity to compete in many events. During his first year he was in considerable pain, mainly, it developed, because his injury had not yet been diagnosed properly. He recalls, "I was doing stretching exercises because I felt a tightness, but that was just the opposite of what I needed.

Jim's father started him in golf at Butler, Pa., Country Club at the age of nine. He lived on a farm and says now, "I'd ride over to the club on my bike in the morning and either play or hit balls most of the day and ride back in the evening."

He started competition at the age of 13 and his progress was rapid. He first enrolled at the University of Houston but, after a year, transferred to Wake Forest. He was on the 1971 Walker Cup team and remained overseas for the 1971 British Amateur, reaching the final round where he lost to Steve Melnyk.

In the 1971 U.S. Open at Merion, he gained national attention by leading the tournament after the third round. He finished in a tie for fifth and was low amateur. He also was low amateur in the 1972 Open at Pebble Beach. He turned pro that fall.

There never has been any question in the mind of Scott Simpson about his ability to win on the TPA TOUR, but he admits his first victory did come as something of a surprise.

It was on the tough Butler National course in the 1980 Western Open. He took the lead after the second day and never was headed, as he posted four rounds of par or better.

"My game was improving," he recalls, "and I knew if I continued to improve, I eventually would win. All of a sudden, I made the big move and won. Yes, I was surprised."

In 1981, although he did not win, he passed the \$100,000 mark again with his best finish being at Pleasant Valley. He finished second to his good friend and long-time rival, Jack Renner. His next best was a tie for third in the Colonial National Invitation.

Scott had an excellent amateur record, winning the National Collegiate titles in 1976 and 1977 for the University of Southern California. "It was after I won it the first time that I thought I would make a career in golf, and someday turn professional. I felt if I could win over a field such as that, then maybe I had a chance."

He also won two PAC-8 titles for the Trojans and was a member of Uncle Sam's Walker Cup Team in 1977. He seemed to be a sure thing.

Yet, he met the disappointment that so many young players have had to face, twice failing to make it through the Tour's tough Qualifying School. He finally made it the third time, in the Fall of 1978.

Scott started in the game as a caddy at age nine for his father, a scratch handicapper in the San Diego area in those days. He was 10 when he entered his first tournament and in the 10-and-under division, Jack Renner was the victor, but Scott tied his brother for fifth.

He knew then that he liked the competition. "My Dad also plays the trumpet, so I did too, but when I was 13, I knew it was either golf or the trumpet, and golf won out."

At age 16, he lost in the finals of the U.S. Junior Championships to Bob Byman — now his closest friend on Tour — and was third in the World Junior.

J. C. Snead had reached the point where he believed his days of winning golf tournaments were gone. After all, it had been five years since his last triumph when he arrived in Columbus, Ga., last fall for the Southern Open.

He stayed in contention through the first three rounds, and then posted a marvelous 66 the last afternoon to tie Mike Sullivan, who had shot a 64 earlier in the afternoon. He won the playoff with a par on the second extra hole and J.C. had the seventh triumph of his career.

"It was wierd how it happened," he said of his final two holes of regulation play. He made a great par at the 17th after missing the green and then holed a curling putt of 25 feet from the back fringe at the 18th to tie.

Certainly one of the game's more colorful people, J. C. has a reputation of occasionally shying away from interviews, but those who follow the game closely know that once they take a few minutes to chat with him, they will be rewarded with one of the better stories of the day.

One of his strongest loves is hunting, and he will spend hours in search of game, especially around his home area of Hot Springs, Va. J. C. and his wife Sue also have a home at Sawgrass in Ponte Vedra Beach, Fla.

He has made the top 60 for the last 11 years. In 1978, when his earnings dipped to \$63,561, he suffered a broken bone in his wrist in a farming accident in Hot Springs and was off the Tour for seven weeks. It happened shortly after he tied for second in the U.S. Open.

Jesse Carlyle, although constantly mentioned as the nephew of the legendary Sam Snead, stands on his own performance record. He was a superb athlete in other sports while growing up in Hot Springs, and at one time, sought a career in baseball. He was in the Washington Senators' farm system before turning to golf as a career in 1964.

He worked for head pro Charlie Beverage at the Century Country Club in Westchester County, N.Y. while twice failing to pass the TPA TOUR Qualifying Test. It was a total of four years before he earned his card in 1968. Following three so-so years, J. C. burst into prominence in 1971 by winning twice in a three-week period, at Tucson and Doral, immediately before and after the PGA Champion-ship at Palm Beach Gardens, Fla.

When Craig Stadler was good in 1981, he was very good indeed, but when he wasn't, he said with a grin, "I wasn't much fun to be around."

He did gain a victory in the Kemper Open at the Congressional Country Club, but he also was a frequent challenger, as he was second twice and third three times. It all added up to his finest money year, \$218,829.

He has said right along that consistency is his biggest problem. There is too large a gap between the weeks he plays well and the weeks he does not, but there has been improvement in that area, too.

At the Kemper, he was at his best, leading by two strokes after three rounds, and finally winning by six over Tom Watson and Tom Weiskopf.

Although he joined the Tour in the Spring of 1976, he didn't get his first victory until the Bob Hope Desert Classic in January of 1980. Later in the year, ne added the Greater Greensboro Open title to his laurels.

He knew, and so did his close followers, that he would win on the Tour. It was a matter of being patient, learning to control his emotions and to work a little harder on his game. Dave Stockton, a close friend, gave Craig some sound advice along these lines just prior to the 1980 Bob Hope, stressing the importance of the mental aspect of the game.

Before turning professional in 1975, Craig compiled an excellent amateur record, highlighted by his victory in the 1973 U.S. Amateur Championship at the Inverness Club in Toledo. "I just made everything that week," he said.

He had given some thought to leaving the University of Southern California after that triumph, but changed his mind. He went on to be an All-America choice for the Trojans in 1974 and 1975 and was named to the 1975 Walker Cup team.

His first attempt at qualifying for the TPA TOUF came in the Fall of 1975 and he didn't make it. He did succeed in June of 1976. He said of his first six months on Tour, "I was just awful."

Craig first played the game at age five with th∈ assistance of his father and really became interested at age "eight or nine." Along the way, he won such titles as the World Junior championship, the San Diego City Amateur and the Southern California Interscholastic.

For many years, Dave Stockton has been one of the better players on Tour and certainly one of golf's finest good-will ambassadors. He is in demand for clinics and exhibitions everywhere. An avid hunter and fisherman, he found the near-perfect combination when he was named the Director of Golf at the Keystone Resort in the high mountain country of Colorado.

Dave is a descendant of a Declaration of Independence signer from New Jersey. He started to play golf seriously at age 17, following an injury to his back in a surfing accident. Dave, just as his father Gail, did, went to the University of Southern California and became captain of the golf team.

Even today, Dave's primary teacher is his father.

He turned professional after leaving school, but struggled for three years before winning the prestigious Colonial National Invitation in 1967. He was invited to the NIT as a Past Champions' choice.

While he has won a total of 11 times, his greatest triumphs have been in two PGAs. The first was in 1970 at Southern Hills in Tulsa, as he outdueled Arnold Palmer down the stretch. He won another in 1976 at the Congressional Country Club, holing a par-saving 13-footer on the final hole to edge Ray Floyd and Don January.

His most productive year was 1974 as he won three times. A brilliant 235-yard three wood shot at the difficult 18th hole at Riviera Country Club set up his one-stroke margin over Sam Snead and John Mahaffey at the Glen Campbell Los Angeles Open. He also won the Quad Cities Open and the Sammy Davis Jr.-Greater Hartford Open. After the latter, he received a phone call from then-President Gerald Ford. He was just leaving the press tent when the call came.

It was like two separate seasons for Dave in 1981. He played reasonably well through the Masters Tournament, with a tie for seventh at Greater Greensboro his best.

In his last 13 tournaments, he only went the distance three times. A putting tip from LPGA star Donna Caponi helped him curve out a first-round 65 in the Greater Milwaukee Open, and he finished tied 13 for his second best performance of the year.

Curtis Strange has learned how to play the role of host very well. He represents the Kingsmill Golf Club in Williamsburg, Va., and therefore took special interest in the Anheuser-Busch Classic held there for the first time in July of 1981.

He not only set a course record with a magnificent seven-under par 64 the third day, but he took time to listen to suggestions and observations of his fellow pros, and to warmly congratulate the winner, John Mahaffey.

While victory somehow eluded him in 1981, he was knocking at the door repeatedly. He lost the prestigious Tournament Players Championship at Sawgrass in a playoff to Raymond Floyd.

It appeared as if he would win the American Motors-Inverrary Classic, but a couple of bogeys on the closing holes let Tom Kite slip by. At season's end, he had 12 top 10 finishes and added another \$201,513 to his bank account.

Curtis has been a winner in golf for most of his life, starting back in his days as a junior golfer in Virginia. He once said, "Physically, I've always had the talent, but I have had to learn how to use it. Patience and maturity are two big keys in the game, and once I learned how to control myself and my game, I was able to improve."

Curtis started to play golf at age seven, "and by the time I was eight, I was playing every day." His father was a golf professional and owned the White Sands Country Club in Virginia Beach, Va.

His father passed away when Curtis was 14, and then, as Curtis explained, "Chandler Harper, the Hall of Famer, became my teacher."

His first taste of success came when he won the Virginia State Junior at age 15 and he won his first important title in 1973, the Southeastern Amateur. However, he said his biggest thrill came when he won the 1975 Eastern Amateur. "My father won the very first Eastern in 1957, so that had special meaning to me."

Curtis carried such titles as the Western Amateur and the National Collegiate with him when he first attempted to earn his TPA TOUR card in the Fall of 1976, but he missed. He came back in the Spring of 1977 and made it.

The holder of the all-time TPA TOUR record for the lowest two consecutive rounds ever shot is neither Nicklaus nor Hogan nor Snead nor Palmer nor Trevino. It's Ron Streck, and he did it in winning his first title, the 1978 San Antonio-Texas Open.

He was close to losing his card at the end of his second year on Tour until he shot 63-62 for a 125. There were six times in the Tour's glorious past when 126s were posted, twice by Sam Snead.

Ron has had one other 62 during his Tour career, and that came in the third round of the 1981 Michelob-Houston Open at The Woodlands. That gave him a three-day total of 15-under par 198 and a two-stroke lead over Hale Irwin and Jerry Pate.

Then the rains came to stay, through Sunday and even Monday, so the tournament was made official after the 54 holes and Ron had his victory.

He went on to complete a productive year, winning \$114,895, by far his finest.

"I think I've gained a level of maturity over the past couple of years, something that just takes some time out here," he said. "I used to let people and my surroundings bother me too often, but I'm more in control now."

Streck's been involved in golf almost since he was old enough to walk. "My Dad was a member of a country club at home, and he started me out when I was four years old," he recalls.

"I liked the game and continued playing right through high school, but I've never had a golf lesson in my life ... I guess you could say I taught myself."

Next came a golf scholarship at the University of Tulsa, and by the end of his freshman year, Ron knew he'd like to give the Tour a try when he finished school.

"It's been a learning process as it is for everyone who plays the Tour," he says.

It would be fine with Mike Sullivan if every tournament on the TPA TOUR could be played at the Green Island Country Club in Columbus, Ga.

In the next-to-last individual tournament of 198C, Mike took the lead in the Southern Open there and went on to a five-stroke victory, his first on Tour. Last year, he shot a superb final-round 64 and was tied with J. C. Snead. Unfortunately for Mike, he bogeyed the second extra hole to lose the playoff.

His check was for \$21,600 and assured him of a place in the top 60. As it turned out, he totaled \$94,844 for the year and finished 41st. Until the Southern, he said, "The whole year has been kind of a struggle. I've had swing problems and haven't known what is wrong."

The year before, he started with a tie for second in the Bob Hope Desert Classic and followed with a third place in the Phoenix, earning a total of \$44,600. That was more than he had won in any single full season. His victory at the Southern led him to a \$147,759 year.

At one point early in 1980, though, Mike wondered what his future might be. After his superb play in the Hope and Phoenix, he suffered severe back muscle spasms and was off the Tour for five weeks. Even when he came back, it was torture for awhile.

Mike played a lot of golf with his father when he was a youngster. "He was a scratch amateur, and taught me everything in those days."

Living in Ocala, Fla., his father took him to see the Florida Citrus Open in Orlando, and the old Greater Jacksonville Open. He went to the University of Florida briefly — and had Andy Bean for a roommate — but he wanted to play golf, and not go to school.

He missed twice in attempting to qualify for the Tour, but made it in the Fall of 1976. When he finished fourth in the 1977 Doral-Eastern Open, he felt he was on his way, but he started to press for success. He won \$8,800 at Doral, and only \$11,170 for the entire year.

He improved considerably in 1978. In the Buick Open, he lost in a playoff to Jack Newton of Australia. The next year was something of a disappointment for Mike, but it still was not too bad. Then came his great start in 1980.

It was another profitable year in 1981 for Leonard Thompson, but the day he'll remember came during the Canadian Open. The Glen Abbey course is one of the more difficult on Tour, but Leonard shot a brilliant nine-under par 31-31—62 for a course record.

He only missed one green, but he still managed birdie as he pitched the ball in. "I can't think of anytime I didn't pick the right club, and I hit everything right at the flag," he said.

He said he used the "same golf ball all the way around," and then gave it to the Royal Canadian Golf Association for its museum at Glen Abbey.

It came during the second round and moved him into the lead, but he finally finished tied for sixth. That was one of the five top 10 finishes, with his best being a tie for fifth in the Doral-Eastern Open.

Leonard joined the Tour in the Fall of 1971, earning his card in his second attempt at the Qualifying School. He had sharpened his game at Wake Forest University, and was a teammate of such players as Lanny Wadkins and Joe Inman.

He progressed steadily and in 1974 won the Jackie Gleason-Inverrary Classic. When his earnings totaled \$122,349, his followers were sure he would continue on to stardom.

It was shortly afterwards that Leonard started to fight the scales. When his weight reached 230, he decided it was time to start a conditioning program. In mid-November of 1974, he went on a crash diet and in $3\frac{1}{2}$ months, lost nearly 50 pounds.

"Suddenly," he said, "I couldn't stop losing. I went to a low of 183 pounds and didn't have any strength."

His earnings dropped almost as rapidly during the next two years, and that was when he decided it was time to seek out Arnold Palmer for help. The next year, he won \$107,293.

At the end of his successful 1977, he won the Pensacola Open by holing a 50-foot putt on the final hole for a birdie and a two-stroke edge on Curtis Strange.

A native North Carolinian, one of the highlights of his career was the course record seven-under par 29 on the back nine at Pinehurst No. 2, set in the 1977 Colgate Hall of Fame Classic.

Lee Trevino had been going to California to pley golf for 14 years, covering 45 tournaments including nine MONY-Tournament of Champions and had never won. That sounds impossible for one of the great players of our time.

He put an end to that nonsense in April of 1981 as he won the T. of C. at LaCosta by two strokes over Raymond Floyd. When reminded that it also was the 14th consecutive year that he had won on the TPA TOUR, he smiled, "That must mean I'm able to play a little bit."

He has played well enough to win \$988,070 ir the last four years, and that's not too bad for a fellow who had back surgery for a herniated disc ir November, 1976. Lee's greatest year on Tour was 1980 when h∈ collected three titles, \$385,814 and won his fifth

Lee's greatest year on Tour was 1980 when he collected three titles, \$385,814 and won his fifth Vardon Trophy with a scoring average of 69.73 for 82 rounds. His average was the lowest on Tour since Sam Snead's 69.23 in 1950 and his money winnings totaled \$150,000 more than he had won in any single season.

In September, he was inducted into the Worlc Golf Hall of Fame at Pinehurst.

Trevino tied for 54th in the 1966 U.S. Open at Olympic Club in San Francisco, and he didn't try the Tour again until a year later at Baltusrol. He placed sixth in that U.S. Open, and was on the Tour to stay. He was chosen "Rookie-of-the-Year" for 1967. Twelve months after Baltusrol, the quickquipping Merry Mex from Dallas was entertaining everyone at the marguerita party at Oak Hill CC, Rochester, where he had just won the 1968 U.S. Open.

Lee won the U.S. Open again in 1971, defeating Jack Nicklaus in a playoff at Merion, and in a span of five weeks that summer he added the Caradian and British Open titles to his fast-growing collection. He was named "Player of the Year" practically by acclamation.

Tommy Valentine was a superb football and basketball player for Gainesville High in Georgia and he admits that he was more into those sports in those days than golf.

He ventured on to the University of Georgia, but believed he was too small for football, so he turned his attention to golf. "I had been playing golf since I was 13," he said, "and I went to Georgia on a look-see basis."

He didn't play his first year, but the Bulldogs did like what they saw. He went on to win the 1970 Southeast Conference title and twice was named to the All-American team. Allen Miller, Bill Kratzert, Lyn Lott and Terry Diehl were teammates.

A natural athlete, he said technique was little more than "look for the flag and swing. That was fine when I was playing well, but when problems occurred, I didn't know how to cure them."

In the NCAA Championship at Ohio State, he won the long drive contest, and even today, Tommy is one of the longest hitters on Tour preferring to play left to right. "I'm not as long now as I used to be," he says with a grin, "but now I can find the ball."

He qualified for the Tour in the Spring of 1977, but by the end of 1978, he lost his playing privileges. He regained them in the Fall of 1978 and has progressed steadily ever since.

In 1981, he was in position to win at least a couple of times. In the Atlanta Classic, he was tied with Tom Watson at the end of regulation play, but lost the playoff on the third extra hole.

In the inaugural LaJet Classic in Abilene, Tex., he led through the first two rounds, fell one stroke in back of Tom Weiskopf after a bad back nine the third day, and finished tied for third.

"Those were two tournaments I might have won," he said, "but I don't feel too bad because the other fellows just played better and beat me."

In the Fall of 1980 after the regular Tour season, he played in the special Johnny Miller Invitational in Boca Raton and won against a fine field. "That was a big stepping stone," he said, "because it assured me that I could win again."

Tommy's mother and father both are fine players. In fact, his Mother has won the Gainesville city and country club championships. They lived next door to Tommy Aaron, and Tommy's father was the head professional at the club where they played.

When things are going right for Lanny Wadkins: there may not be anyone better. And, it doesn't seem to make any difference how difficult the course or the conditions may be.

In 1977, for example, Lanny came from well off the pace to tie Gene Littler in the PGA Championship at Pebble Beach, and then won it all on the thirc extra hole. Three weeks later on the demanding South Course at Firestone Country Club, he shot a record 13-under par 267 to win the World Series of Golf by five strokes.

Late that same year, he suffered a torn rib muscle on his right side while lifting cases from the trunk of his car, and his play suffered, but he bounced back with a great year in 1979. He won the Glen Campbell Los Angeles Open on the famed Riviera course, and a month later captured the Tournament Players Championship at Sawgrass in conditions beyond belief.

There were wind gusts up to 45 miles per hour the last afternoon, and Lanny calmly went on to finish with a five-under 283 and win by five, over Torn Watson. More than half of the field that year did not break 300.

His earnings have dropped off the last two years, but in 1980, he did pass the \$1 million mark in winnings.

Lanny enjoyed a brilliant amateur career, highlighted by a victory in the 1970 U.S. Amateur. It wasn't any surprise when he became an immediate success on the TPA TOUR. After earning his player's card in the Fall of 1971, he went on to wir the 1972 Sahara Invitational.

His superb play continued through 1973, winning \$200,455, with victories in the Byron Nelson Classic in Dallas and the USI Classic in Sutton, Mass. His game started to sag in 1974. As the year progressed, he found it difficult to maintain his energy. In the fall his ailment was diagnosed as a diseased gall bladder, and in early December he underwent an operation for its removal.

Going against doctor's orders, he returned to the TPA TOUR in less than three months. Still weak, he developed bad habits and he admits it wash't until mid-1976 that he was able to get his game back in its original groove.

It would have been a brilliant year for any other player, but for Tom Watson, after the standards he has set the last few years, it was a disappointment. He wasn't pleased with the way he was striking the ball, all through 1981

He still managed to win three tournaments, including the Masters after catching Jack Nicklaus during the final 36 holes. He also won the USF&G New Orleans Open for a second straight year and the Atlanta Classic. He finished second three times, losing once in a playoff to Bruce Lietzke in the Byron Nelson Classic.

For the first time in five years, he was not the No. 1 money winner, relinquishing that title to Tom Kite and actually finishing third. After being PGA Player-of-the-Year for four straight years, he bowed to Bill Rogers in 1981.

It would have been extremely difficult to duplicate his 1980, though, when he won six times on the TPA TOUR, plus the British Open. He won a record \$530,808 becoming the first player to break the half-million dollar mark.

Since he won \$1,065 for a tie for 28th in his first start on Tour in the 1971 Kaiser International Open, this personable fellow has elevated himself to a position with the all-time greats. He is a tireless worker, even amazing his tutor, Byron Nelson.

He turned in one of his more amazing feats in the spring of 1980 when he won three straight starts, and through those 12 rounds, never was out of the lead. He won the MONY-Tournament of Champions at LaCosta, and the next week won the New Orleans Open. After skipping a week, he won the Byron Nelson Classic for a third straight year.

Tom was only six years old when his father, a scratch golfer, exposed him to the game. He became a four-time winner of the Missouri State Amateur and played for three years at Stanford University before graduating in 1971 with a degree in psychology. While in high school, Tom also starred in football and basketball.

Each year, D. A. Weibring's game gets a little better and soon he is expected to blossom out as a full-fledged star. He has increased his money winnings to a high of \$92,365 last year with six top 10 finishes.

It is interesting to note that he won approximately \$14,000 more than the year before, yet his stroke average was exactly the same, 71.89.

He has his best finishes at the beginning and the end. He tied for fourth in the Bob Hope Desert Classic, his second start of the year; and he tied for second in the Hall of Fame Classic, his next-to-last start.

He also emerged as one of the Tour's more colorful personalities. In numerous clinics and exhibitions, he played the straight man for Peter Jacobsen.

D.A. earned his first victory in the Quad Cities Open in 1979, and the way it happened, he couldn't have been more delighted.

His father had suffered a mild heart attack on the Sunday of the Western Open, approximately 10 days earlier. "That gave us quite a scare," D.A. said.

"I wasn't going to play in Milwaukee that next week, but Dad wanted me to, so I did. I felt the thing that would make him the happiest was to play well, and I felt I did.

"The Quad Cities is close to my home," he said pointing out that Quincy, III., is about 200 miles from the tournament site. "If I had to pick one place I would want to win my first tournament, the Quad Cities would be it."

While the victory was extremely satisfying to the graduate of Illinois State University, what pleased him most was the fact that his father had recovered enough to be at Oakwood with his mother to see him do it.

D. A. joined the Tour in June of 1977, earning his card on his third attempt at the qualifying school. In his first full year of 1978, he won \$41,052, finishing 75th on the money list.

He explained how the use of his initials came about.

"My father's name also is Donald Albert, and when I was a youngster, Mom decided she didn't want me to be called 'Little Don,' or 'Junior,' so she started to call me D. A. It has been with me ever since."

The scene was the inaugural LaJet Classic at the Fairway Oaks Country Club in Abilene, Tex., and it turned out to be one of the most satisfying events in a long and splendid career of Tom Weiskopf.

He won the tournament, his first victory in three-and-a-half years. The check for \$63,000 let him become only the fourth player in Tour history to win at least \$2 million. And, the victory qualified him for a spot in the 1982 Masters Tournament. Last year was the first time in 13 years he wasn't playing at Augusta National, and it hurt.

Tom had been saying for sometime that he was playing well and he wasn't that far from winning again.

It was his 14th Tour triumph. With a laugh, he said, "I've always been a very supersticious person, like going through the same hotel door and eating the same food when I'm playing well. I thought I'd never get this hump of 13 wins off my back."

At the LaJet, he gained a one-stroke lead after three rounds with a two-under par 70 when his closest rivals were collapsing in the high winds. He finally won by two over Gil Morgan.

Earlier in the year, he finished second alone to Johnny Miller in the Glen Campbell Los Angeles Open and tied for second in the Kemper Open. He finished with \$177,396, his best money year since 1977.

The first of Tom's Tour victories came in the 1968 Andy Williams-San Diego Open when he eagled the final hole. His greatest year was 1973, when during an eight-week period in the spring and summer, he won five tournaments, including the British and Canadian Opens. In a stretch of 40 rounds, he had 20 in the 60's.

Later in 1973, he won the World Series of Golf (under the old four-man format) and the South African PGA. Several groups named him as their Player-of-the-Year.

Fuzzy Zoeller knows he will have to live with a painful back, and when it acts up, he has serious problems. When he catches a week that the pain subsides and the medication takes effect, look out.

Such a week was in mid-May at the prestigious Colonial National Invitation in Fort Worth, and Fuzzy made that his own tournament. He led from the second round on and finally won by four strokes over Hale Irwin. As the year moved on, he finished second alone in the PGA Championship and tied for third in the LaJet Classic.

"It's an old injury," he explains. "One night playing high school basketball, I was submarined and the back has bothered me from time-to-time ever since."

There have been times when he has had to wear a corset; times when he could not bend over to pick the ball out of the cup; and times when he couldn't play at all.

Fuzzy blossomed as a superstar in 1979 when he won the Andy Williams-San Diego Open and also the Masters Tournament. He was six strokes in back of Ed Sneed starting the last round at Augusta National, and when he finished, he was thinking second place. As he sat in the scorers' tent at the 18th green, with Tom Watson, he watched Sneed bogey the last hole to force a three-way playoff. Fuzzy defeated Ed and Tom on the third extila hole.

His victory did surprise the experts, because this was his first trip to the Masters.

Fuzzy first gained "fame" at the 1976 Quad Cities Open when he birdled the last eight holes of the first round to tie Bob Goalby's all-time Tour record, set in the 1961 St. Petersburg Open.

Zoeller grew up alongside a fairway at the Valley View CC in New Albany, Ind., and it seemed natural when he started swinging a golf club at age three. He entered his first tournament two years later. He enjoyed all sports while growing up, but when he was eight his father said to him, "Son, all we're doing is running back and forth between the golf course and the baseball diamond. You had better choose one."

Fuzzy chose golf, but during his days in high school he played varsity basketball, mainly, he said to "keep in shape for golf, and in Indiana in the winter you can't play golf."

He was second in the state scholastic golf tournament in 1970 and went to Edison Junior College in Florida, where he won the State Junior College title before entering the University of Houston.

In its brief eight-year history, the Tournament Players Championship has become one of the world's premier golf events, due largely to two mportant factors. First, the TPC annually assembles the best field in competitive golf, the top 144 money earners on the TPA TOUR. Secondly, its reputation has been molded by the infamous Sawgrass course that has bedeviled TPC performers since 1977. Wind and rain have often sent scores soaring upwards, making par a meaningful figure.

It won't get any easier in 1982 when the TPC moves to its new permanent home, the Tournament Players Club, across the highway from Sawgrass. The TPC is certain to attract a massive amount of media attention because of the exciting, well-publicized venue, and this will likely add to the event's prestige.

With huge spectator mounds and amphitheaters as part of the landscape, the Tournament Players Club is destined to revolutionize tournament golf, providing clear, unobstructed views for thousands of spectators on nearly every hole. This Pete Dye-designed masterpiece, requiring pinpoint accuracy on every shot, provides one of the most challenging tests of golf anywhere in the world.

Veteran Ray Floyd, coming off the most successful year of his career, will defend his TPC title on the new course. He came to Sawgrass in 1581 just having won the Doral-Eastern Open, with a chance to pick up an attention-getting \$200,000 bonus as part of the Florida Triple Bonus program — If he could score two straight with a wn at the TPC.

Floyd's chances appeared slim, however, as h€ began the final round (postponed by rain until Monday) six shots behind leader Barry Jaeckel and well back in the pack. His final round 68 was enough, though, to tie him with Jaeckel and Curtis Strange at three-under par 285, forcing a three-way playoff. Jaeckel, leaving a six-foot putt short at the 72nd hole, had led after the second and third rounds, but struggled in with a final round 74. Strange had put together four solid rounds of 72-72-71-70.

Suddenly the golf world realized that Floyd was on the doorstep of the biggest payday in the sport's history, should he emerge from the playoff as the victor. He did, parring the first extra hole to close out Jaeckel and Strange. In addition to the \$72,000 first prize, Floyd also collected the \$200,000 bonus. Counting the \$45,000 he had won the week before at Doral, the 38-year-old Miamian had bagged \$317,000 in two weeks.

Floyd's line score of 72-74-71-68—285 was seven shots higher than Lee Trevino's winning performance a year earlier, but 1981 provided the expected foul Sawgrass weather that Trevino had escaped. High winds prevailed Thursday and Friday before a short calming trend on Saturday ... but Sunday's torrential rains forced a Monday finish that was better suited to an ice-skating exhibition.

Through it all charged Raymond. "It's very satisfying to win, especially since nearly everyone had written me off after falling six shots behind," he remarked. "I never gave up on myself, and it obviously paid off."

To the tune of \$272,000.



Classic Finish at the 18th Hole Provides Victory for Bill Rogers in the World Series of Golf

In a year in which many players were enjoying superlative seasons, a dominant figure emerged in dramatic fashion at the World Series of Golf in late August in Akron. In its sixth year under the expanded format, the World Series had its strongest international representation and thus became a fitting place for Bill Rogers to step forward and place his special stamp on the 1981 season.

By the time Rogers arrived in Akron, he had already made the season a special one, winning both the Heritage Classic, in March, and in July taking the British Open crown. The victory at Heritage was especially sweet, ending, as it did, more than two years of campaigning without a victory. Rogers had set a record by earning \$230,500 in 1979 without a victory.

But there was more to come for Mr. Rogers in 1981, as indicated by his opening 68 at Firestone South. That two-under-par round placed him neatly in a first-round tie with Hale Irwin and the rising young German star, Bernhard Langer.

Irwin took a one-shot lead after another 68 on Friday, while Rogers and Langer, with 69's, were joined in second place by Larry Nelson, who turned in a 66. Jack Nicklaus, at two-under 138, was another shot back and in the company of Jerry Pate and Isao Aoki, the latter firing a 65 which proved to be the low round of the week.

A mark of championship courses is the consistent presence of quality players as winners and leaders, and that was certainly the case as anticipation built for the weekend. Irwin's thirdround 70 kept him two in front of Rogers and Nelson, but the supporting cast three shots back, at 209, now included Tom Kite, after a 66, plus Greg Norman of Australia, Langer, and now Jack Nicklaus.

While threats failed to materialize from those four stars, on Sunday, the day's competition centered on Irwin, who struggled, and on Rogers and Kite, who battled through a tension-filled back nine.

Kite, with birdies at 11 and 12, took a one-stroke lead and was headed for a finishing 67. At the 13th, though, Irwin three-putted for a most costly bogey while Rogers rolled home a 35-footer for birdie to give him a share of the lead with Kite.

Kite had two more good chances for birdies, from 13 feet at the par-five 16th, and from 15 feet at the last hole, but that was to be the site of Rogers' heroics.

He, too, had missed a golden opportunity to lock up the tournament earlier, missing a 10footer at the 17th. So it came down to the last hole, with two of golf's guttiest players tied for the lead.

"When I heard the crowd's reaction to Tom's putt (at 18), I knew he had missed the birdie. Now I had my chance. I had a five-iron to the green, and I couldn't have had an easier putt," Rogers said later of the 12-footer.

With Kite watching, then turning away in disappointment, Rogers rammed the birdle putt squarely into the center of the cup, lighting up huge smiles for both he and wife Beth.

While Kite finished second, Aoki finished off a solid week with a 67 to gain a share of third place with Irwin, who continued a string of top-five finishes in World Series play. Raymond Floyd moved into fifth alone, also closing with a 67, while Nelson, Langer, Bruce Lietzke and David Graham shared sixth place.

RYDER CUP MATCHES

The Ryder Cup Matches developed from a match played between representatives of the American and British Professional Golfers' Association in England in 1926. That unofficial match, incidentally, was won by the British $13\frac{1}{2}$ to $1\frac{1}{2}$.

Following this highly successful exhibition, Samuel A. Ryder, a wealthy British seed merchant, offered to donate a solid gold trophy bearing his name to be competed for in a series of matches between professionals of the two nations.

From the start of the series through the 1959 Ryder Cup matches, the competition was comprised of four foursome matches one day and eight singles matches the other day, each at 36 holes.

In 1961, the format was changed to provide for four 18-hole foursomes the morning of the first day and four more that afternoon, then for eight 18-hole singles the morning of the second day and eight more that afternoon. As in the past, one point was at stake in each match, so the total number of points was doubled.

In 1963, for the first time, a day of four-ball matches augmented the program to add new interest to the overall competition. This brought the total number of points to 32.

In 1977, the format was altered once again. This time there were five foursomes on the opening day, five four-ball matches on the second day, and ten singles matches on the final day. This reduced the total number of points to 20.

For 1979, eligibility for the Great Britain-Ireland side was expanded to include all British PGA/European TPD members who are residents of European nations.

The 1983 Ryder Cup Matches will be played at PGA National, Palm Beach Gardens, Florida, October 14-16.

THE VARDON TROPHY

The PGA Vardon Trophy, named in honor of the internationally famous British Golfer, Harry Vardon, was placed in competition among American professionals in 1937 as a successor to the Henry E. Radix Trophy, which, prior to that time, had been awarded annually to the professional having the finest tournament record in play in this country.

Today, the Vardon Trophy, a bronze colored plaque measuring 39"x 27" is awarded each year to the member of the PGA of America maintaining the finest playing average in those events co-sponsored or so designated by the PGA in each such period. A minimum of 80 rounds in tournaments considered official by PGA is required to win.
